Income Tax Needed in the Case of Tisdale

Dropping Income Tax Would Mean Addition to Tax Rate. Township Council Discusses Need for Water Meters and Other Questions.

South Porcupine, March 11th, 1931. Special to The Advance.

On Tuesday evening there was a session of the council of Tisdale when the reeve and all the councillors were present.

There was considerable discussion over the bill on municipal income taxation which is at present before the legislature of Ontario. For townships like Tisdale income tax is the fairest tax of all. Should the present bill go through the legislature it might mean an increase of 16 mills on the dollar for such a township as this.

H. V. Grewco reported on his examination of the fire-truck at Schumacher and from an external examination did not seem to think the cost of making the engine as good as new would be out of the way at all. As nearly as could be judged from the scaling of the enamel it had been burnt out at some time which would mean warped valves, etc. He was directed to give it the proper overhauling and while the work is being done a truck will be rented to carry hose, etc., in Schumacher in case of emergency.

Considerable discussion came up re installing of water meters. This seems to be an absolute necessity in the west end of the township where the water is paid for by the gallon for the convenience of the patrons and the amount used is abnormal on being compared with other localities. Also in the South Porcupine part, while not such a necessity yet, as one councillor remarked, a meter would be the fairest method. Then those who wished to use tap water for frigidation in summer would pay accordingly, etc. Livermen with empty stalls in their barn would only pay for amount used. The clerk was instructed to get prices on a quantity of meters. Assessor Smith remarked on the extra time this work was taking in Schumacher owing to the extensive building that is going on there. The sale of the wood cut as an unemployment emergency was taken up. The Coniaurum had contracted to take 100 cords which helped some. It was remarked that the rock-cutting for the same purpose had been more costly than if it had been let on contract. The council wished it could get sale for rock as readily as for wood. The routine bills and accounts were passed for payment.

Nine Men in Court on Vagrancy Charge

Town Officers Working to Rid the Town of Undesirables. Large Number of Other Cases at Police Court This Week.

Acting Chief of Police E. Moore is making earnest effort to rid the town of some undesirable transients who have strayed in here recently. Nine of these were charged with vagrancy in the police court this week. Some had been making a habit of loafing around town all day and then going to the police station at night or in the early morning for a bed. Some had been begging around town. One of them made a mistake and called at the acting chief's house when the latter was home. There have been complaints about transients accosting women and others in town and about others trying to beg meals rather than look elsewhere for work. The authorities are evidently determined that Timmins is not to become a mecca for vagrants, and hence the court cases. Eight of the accused this week were remanded until next week to give them a chance to get out of town and secure work. There is not any work to secure here for the transients. The ninth man accused of vagrancy was sent to jail for two months.

The town police had five common drunks before the court, each paying the customary \$10.00 and costs.

A woman recently here from Sudbury was charged with illegally having liquor in a public place. Her case was remanded for a week. A man found in the house with liquor paid \$100.00 and costs on a similar charge.

E. Journeau, Wilson avenue, was fined \$200.00 and costs on a charge of having liquor in a public place.

All the above were town cases, and the provincial police had a list not quite so long. This list included drunks, and liquor cases, as well as a case of non-support of wife, and two cases of non-support of father. All these cases were adjourned until next week.

The next regular meeting of the Timmins town council will be held on Monday, March 23rd, commencing at 4 p.m.

Medical Comforts in New Quarters Now

St. John Ambulance Brigade Have New Headquarters at 90 Third Avenue. Medical Comforts Station Now Located There.

The Medical Comforts station of the St. John Ambulance Brigade is now located at the new headquarters of the association at 90 Third avenue, next to Shankman's store. The medical comforts were formerly kept at the hospital, but lack of room there handicapped the work and when the S.J.A.B. secured their present premises on Third avenue they decided to have the medical comforts there for the greater convenience and comfort of the public. All the doctors, nurses and others specially interested have been notified of the change, and this will inform the general public.

The medical comforts branch of the St. John Ambulance Brigade in Timmins has grown to considerable proportions and the plan has proved of very material advantage to Timmins. The idea of the medical comforts branch is to provide needs for the sick room. The equipment of the branch includes beds, blankets, sheets, bed pans, and all sorts of equipment that may be needed in case of illness or accident. When these things are needed, they are required very much and very urgently, and the St. John Ambulance Brigade medical comforts branch is striving to supply the need. The use of the sickroom equipment carried may be secured through any of the local doctors. In the past the service has proven simply invaluable to many. The Ambulance Brigade is planning extensions of the service given the public in time of sickness or accident. The S.J.A.B. are fixing up their new headquarters at 90 Third avenue, and plan to have a presentable and useful place there for public service.
