The Prince Albert case appears to be one where the source of the fish is not close to rail connection. In the case of the James Bay fish there will be ample railway facilities supplied by the T. & N. O. Refrigerator car service will be necessary to handle any quantity of the fish and it would seem to be more practical and economical to put this on at Moose Factory rather than at any point like Cochrane, Kapuskasing, Hearst, North Bay or other cutside point. The use of the airplane, unless for direct shipment to consumer's market, would seem to be impractical. The use of the airplane for bringing fish to Timmins, North Bay, Sudbury and so on, for the local market, might be a profitable plan, but for the general outside market and distribution the rail service would appear to be necessary unless direct routes by airplane to other big markets could be maintained. In this North Land, however, everybody is ready to try anything once and no one need fear that if shipping the fish by airplane is practical that it will not be adopted.

#### Secretary-Treasurer | QUEBEC BOARD OF TRADE FAVOURS HIGHWAY ROUTE

Under the heading of "Transcontinental Highway," the annual report of the Quebec City board of trade has the following paragraphs that will no doubt be read with interest in this North

Land:— "The matter of a transcontinental highway was discussed during the convention of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and two routes have been roposed for this transcontinental highway, the southern route via the North shore of Lake Ontario and Sudbury, and the Northern route via Abitibi and

Northern Ontario districts. "In the interests of Quebec, of the province, and of the country in general the council is of the opinion that the northern route would be the most profitable connecting the colonization district of Abitibi and the clay belt of On-

"The council has requested your president to interview Hon. J. E. Perrault, Minister of Roads, to explain the advantages of such a route through the northern section of the province."

Premier Taschereau has recently indicated his sympathy with this request and viewpoint, and promises to take early action to carry it into effect. Some of the federal members from Quebec province may be expected to discuss it in the House of Commons at the present session, after the Easter
