**Mill Recommended at Central Patricia**

New Company is Planned. Basis of Exchange one Share of New for Four of Old Company. 50-Ton Mill Suggested.

Accompanying the annual report of Central Patricia Mines Limited for the year ended Dec. 31, 1930, is a notice of a special general shareholders' meeting. This meeting is called for the purpose of considering a proposal to form a new company. In this connection, F. M. Connell, President, states: "Your directors propose that a new company be incorporated, with a capital of 2,500,000 shares of the par value of \$1 each, to acquire the assets of this company on a basis whereby each shareholder of this company will receive one share of the capital of the new company for every four shares now held by them in this company. There will be approximately 1,580,000 shares in the treasury of the new company."

In his report, W. E. Segsworth, Manager, states that metallurgical tests conducted by General Engineering Company of Sault Lake City; Department of Mines, Ottawa; and W. G. Hubler, mill superintendent at Amulet Mines, on ore from the property, have now gone far enough to indicate commercial results may be obtained by the cyanide process, and the management believes erection of a 50-ton mill is justified.

Mr. Segsworth estimates the sum of \$150,000 will cover installation of the new plant and put in supplies to carry the operation to Dec. 31, 1932.

"Experience gained in freighting to the mine in 1930 has furnished data which assures us freighting, even on this small operation, can be handled on an economic basis, and the costs could be considerably reduced on large-scale operations," he continues. "The plant already installed, with the mill and another boiler, will carry the operation at 50 tons a day. The amount of ore estimated will keep the mill in operation two and one-half years, and operating profit should furnish a fund sufficient to pay for the mill and carry on enough exploration and development to test out the prospects."

John A. Reid, consulting engineer, in his report on the property, says three ore shoots have been developed: "A" from surface to 250 feet; "B" and "C" from surface to 500 feet. Allowing an average stop width of 5 feet, he estimates these three shoots contain 33,155 tons, averaging \$13.71 per ton, or a gross total of \$454,555.

Regarding the possible ore, Mr. Reid states: "B" and "C" shoots have, in all probability, a greater width than actually shown in sampling over the drifts. "C" shoot has, in one place on the 375-foot level, 15.3 feet running

**Addition Planned to Curling Rink Here**

Two Extra Sheets of Ice Likely to be Added to Present Rink. Directors Suggest Plan for Financing. Plan Generally Approved.

During the past season the Timmins Curling Club was unusually popular and successful and next season promises to be even more satisfactory and pleasing. Plans are now under way to add two extra sheets of ice and the method of financing this as proposed by the directors seems to be meeting with very general approval from the shareholders and members of the club. As the Northern Ontario bonspiel is to be

held in Timmins next winter extra ice will be absolutely necessary and the directors found that to provide this accommodation by securing ice at the skating rink or elsewhere would entail an expenditure of at least \$200.00 which would be an outlay that would do no more than serve the need for the time being. To add two sheets of ice to the present curling rink would be a permanent advantage. The directors found that this latter and better plan would only entail an expenditure of \$500.00, and they suggest that the necessary financing could be done by each shareholder contributing \$5.00 or more. The plan seems to be very generally approved and it is likely that it will be carried through successfully.

The directors have sent out a letter to each of the shareholders of the Timmins Curling Club, Limited, this letter explaining itself and reading as follows: "The Northern Ontario bonspiel is to be held in Timmins next winter. In order to hold such a bonspiel it will be necessary to have more ice than is available at the Timmins Curling Rink, there being only four sheets of ice. Probably arrangements could be made to obtain the ice of the Timmins Skating Rink which would, however, involve having an attendant at the skating rink during the bonspiel as well as the transportation of the rocks back and forth from the curling rink to the skating rink. If this arrangement were entered into it would cost the club perhaps \$200.00. It would be more advantageous and a better investment to have two sheets of ice added to the curling rink. A competent contractor has estimated that two sheets could be added at a cost of \$500.00 and by having the four present sheets and two extra ones all under the same roof it would be a great benefit to the club and a permanent investment. One feature of it would be that there would then always be at least four good inside sheets even though the two outside were not in perfect shape. The directors of your club are in favour of investing the sum of \$500.00 to add two sheets of ice at the curling rink and to have all six sheets under the one roof. The directors do not desire to increase the fees in order to obtain the money necessary for this project but have decided to make an appeal to each member of the club for a voluntary subscription of at least \$5.00 or more. If you are in favour of this proposal would you be kind enough to return this letter to the secretary of the club with your donation on or before April 30th, 1931. If the majority are in favour of the proposal and sufficient money is donated the project will be gone ahead with, but if not your donation will be returned."

A despatch from Haileybury last week says:—How two Northern Ontario men who went to New York City in connection with extradition proceedings started in connection with a charge laid by their former employers against Sydney Samuel Rosenberg, discovered to their great surprise that Rosenberg was living in the United States commercial metropolis with a young woman to whom he was not married was related in the Supreme Court at Haileybury Saturday morning to Mr. Justice Garrow when Mrs. Sonie Rosenberg asked for a dissolution of her marriage with her husband.

It was the first divorce case heard in Haileybury, and both it and another similar application, in which Arthur Thompson sought to have the marital tie with Julia Thompson dissolved, were granted by the judge, who disposed of both actions in proceedings that lasted exactly 55 minutes. Neither case was defended, and in both M. G. Hunt, Kirkland Lake lawyer, who appeared for the plaintiffs, was told his clients were entitled to the relief they asked.

In the evidence given in the Rosenberg case, Harry Pine, Ansonville barrister and Karl Kussner, brother of Mrs. Rosenberg, told how they had gone to New York City after making arrangements with the attorney-general of Ontario and the British consul-general to have Rosenberg brought back to Canada on a charge laid by Perkus and Co., by whom he had been employed. In New York they found him keeping a store and in an apartment at 1544 President street discovered Rosenberg and a woman named Rita Cohen living as man and wife though not married.

The Northerners learned Rosenberg had met the young woman on his first night in New York. Rosenberg had been brought back to Canada, tried and punished, the evidence related and subsequently he had been living in Toronto with a woman named Rita Cohen, a coincidence in names, Mr. Hunt said. Evidence was produced to show that Mrs. Rosenberg's niece had witnessed the serving of papers on Rosenberg and the woman, and after the wife had told how her husband had left their home in Kirkland Lake and had not contributed to the family support, the relief asked was granted. The parties were married in Montreal in 1917.

In the other action Thompson told the court that Sydney McCoubrey, with whom he alleged his wife is now living in Kirkland Lake, had come to their home as a boarder and after he left for another home, Mrs. Thompson continued to associate with him to such an extent that finally the husband left home, although making some contribution for a time to her support. According to Constable Bird, at the time acting chief of police of Tack Township, he had gone to investigate a request by Mrs.
