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

Teck-Hughes Levels. Special Committee Appointed Last Week.

"Construction of a connecting passage between the 3,600-foot level of the Kirkland Lake Gold Mines and the nearest corresponding level of the Teck-Hughes Mines, and the establishment of a rescue station in that passage which will be accessible to both mines, has been ordered by Hon. Charles McCrea, Minister of Mines for Ontario.

"A special committee, consisting of John Knox, Assistant General Manager of Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines; Ernest J. Hibert, of Noranda, consulting engineer for Horne Copper Corporation, and Robert W. Brigstocke, Toronto consulting engineer, has been appointed under Government Order-in-Council to make all necessary examinations and investigations to bring the tunnel construction about.

"This passage and the rescue station have been under advisement by the Government for some time. Last fall the owners of the two mines failed to reach an amicable agreement on the underground connection, although its building had been requested of them by the Mines Department. The failure is responsible, it is understood, for the action now taken by Hon. Mr. McCrea. "Officials of the Mines Department,

During the fall, The Advance had an article describing the way the men have been treated by the H.E.P.C.'s foremen.

All this does not seem to be right to fair-minded Canadian men. Surely we are not going backward, and saying that we are enjoying it! To say so would be an act of injustice and sin to our souls, and an injury to civilization and to Canada.






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
