

### Inquest Into Death of Late D. Bertrand

Held at South Porcupine on Tuesday This Week. Verdict of Jury. Other News from South Porcupine and the Dome.

South Porcupine, Ont., May 20th, 1931. Special to The Advance.

The opening game of football for this season at the Dome was played on the Dome Recreation grounds on Wednesday evening, May 13th, between McIntyre Football club and the Dome. The score was 5-0 for the home team. Had it not been for the stellar work of Leonard in goal for the McIntyres the score would have been much higher. During the greater part of the two periods he was literally bombarded by the aggressive Dome. Besides him on the line-up were Rankin, O'Connell, Edgell, O'Connor, McGregor, Carroll, Phillips, Morris and Johnson. Rowe was in goal for the Dome but had an easy night of it, only on a few occasions being called on to exert himself. Blair and Mitchell were the backs; Saunders, Whyte, and Doran as half-backs; Rudkin, Cook, Foster, Richmond and Sharp forwards, while R. Jones was their reserve man. Mr. Pat Larmer was referee and apparently gave all-round satisfaction as such. Rudkin tallied the first counter for the Dome. Later a nice piece of combination work from Rudkin to Foster to Richmond looked like a winner but the final boost to the pigskin was too lofty. Play was kept in the territory of the McIntyres most of the time during this period the Dome being too fast for the visitors even if they did get headed towards Rowe and they seldom got far past centre. Richmond scored the second goal for the home team and Cook the third. In the second period the McIntyres at times staged some hot work around Rowe but it was not hot enough nor did it last long enough to get on the tally-sheet. The score against them in the first period when they were playing with the setting sun in their eyes seemed to be a handicap that took the zip out of their play in the second when they had the more favourable position. Richmond scored another for his team and Whyte made the fifth tally. The attendance was exceptionally good, a large number coming from Schumacher to support the McIntyres, as well as Dome and South Porcupine fans being out in full force.

This week a hedge is being planted around the manse and in front of the United Church. Six shade trees have also been planted there, making a very great improvement in the appearance of the property. The trees and hedge were purchased by Miss A. M. Pettigrew and presented to the church. As from year to year they grow and increase in beauty they will be a happy reminder of the kindness and thought of the donor. Mrs. J. Fell of the Dome has donated thirty-five dollars towards the planting of the outside of the church and the Ladies' Guild are taking care of the remainder. By mid-summer this church and grounds ought to be one of the most inviting in appearance in the North Land.

The inquest into the death of the late David Bertrand was held in the council chambers on Tuesday, May 19th. Doctors McLaren, McClinton and Kinsman each testified as to the victim's injuries and the cause of death. Mr. Emmonds, the demonstrator in the car which caused the accident, gave evidence as to how it happened. Then S. Kulibaba was called. He was driver at the time of the accident. He claimed the horse got scared first before the car touched the wagon and backed it into the ditch. The wagon was in the ditch when the car hit it. He claimed he did not stop the car because he got so scared he did not know what to do. The other man put on the hand brakes but the car went nearly twenty feet afterwards. The sixteen-foot reach of the wagon hit the front door on the right side of the car when it hit the wagon in the ditch. The car did not hit the wagon before it went into the ditch. Mrs. Kulibaba was called and stated that she and her little girl were in the back seat of the car at the time of the accident. She was sitting on the left side. She yelled when she was afraid the car was going into the ditch and the little girl grabbed her so she did not know what else happened. Constable Fulton stated that measurements showed that when the brake was put on the car was four and a half feet from the left side of the road and continued to the side of the road. Mr. Dickson mining recorder had gone out with the police after the accident and saw the marks on the road as stated. Mr. H. Dunbar, of Timmins, came to the scene shortly after the accident. The victim had then been lifted out of the ditch to the shoulder of the road. The car was nosed into the ditch. He brought him into the hospital. Emmonds was re-called and asked to show

his operator's license. He claimed that Mr. Bertrand was lying in the ditch possibly twenty feet from the wagon when he (Emmonds) got out of the car. He thought the poles of the wagon had thrown him there. He had not boards on the wagon—just a number of 2 x 4's. The garage man who repaired the car stated that there was no damage whatever done to the front of the car but that the door and fender were scratched and dinged. The jury consisted of Messrs J. T. Smith, S. Pearce, E. J. Rapsey, W. Wilson, J. Firth, A. Londry and McDowell, foreman. They brought in the following verdict after a lengthy deliberation:—"We, your jury, are of the opinion that the late David Bertrand died May 10th in the Presbyterian hospital, South Porcupine, as the result of injuries received April 18th, 1931, on the Timmins-South Porcupine highway from his horse taking fright at an automobile and overturning him in the ditch."

During the past week the new office of Mr. E. W. Ahr, who is operating an aeroplane from Porcupine Lake, was rushed nearly to completion. It is at the foot of Golden avenue overlooking the lake and is a neat looking four-roomed structure. It will serve as waiting room for customers, office and quarters for his crew. During the past week trips to various points in the district have been made daily. The machine now in use is a light whirlwind cabin monoplane. He contemplates bringing another machine, also, to this base shortly. Porcupine Lake is the best lake in the district as an aeroplane base. With the improvements made at the foot of Golden avenue it is easily accessible by motor. The dock will be re-placed immediately. It is no farther into the Matachewan district from here than from Elk Lake. At no other base in the north are mining supplies and equipment available so easily as at the base here. The best of hotel accommodation is available in the camp. This is a central location for various mining districts. Chibougamau trips can readily be arranged for as well as Matachewan and other new fields. There is ample room at the base of Golden avenue for the accommodation of cars of visitors and this is getting to be a favourite rendezvous. There is some talk of cleaning the lake along the shore and making a swimming pool in the vicinity but this is still not a reality. The improvements that have been made, however, are a fine advantage to the town. It is just possible that Porcupine Lake being so centrally located
