

#### Vicar and Sunday Schools

"I feel to-day there are two hindrances to Sunday School work. First the church throughout the country does not take interest in the work. We vicars, of course, are to blame a great deal. Our lives are very full on Sundays, and we cannot give the time we ought to work among the children.

"But at the same time I feel it is not merely the responsibility of parsons Church people themselves do not take the interest and it would be of great benefit to the work if they did. I do not know, for instance how many of us have taken the trouble to give encouragement to our Sunday School teachers. Theirs is hard and laborious work, and the least we can do is to say 'Thank you' and assure them of our sympathy, interest and prayers.

"Secondly, there is the lack of coperation between jurents and Sunday School teachers. No matter how good the Sunday School teachers are, if there is no co-operation in the home, the seed that is sown on Sunday afternoon is soon going to be choked. The great hing the Sunday School teachers are up against to-day, is the fact that parents don't set their children an example of a church-going and religious life. Very few parents take the trouble to go into church unless it is for a baptism, wedding, or funeral, and so the esent generation is not receiving the help they ought to have from the home
