Former Resident of Camp Dies in S. A.

Johan Snyman, Formerly of the Hollinger and Dome, Drowned from Dinghy in Table Bay, South Africa, Recently.

Many friends in the Porcupine camp will learn with deep regret of the death of Johan Snyman, a former resident of this camp for some year. The late Mr. Snyman was drowned from a dinghy while yachting on Table Bay, South Africa. The late Mr. Snyman was well-known and well liked in this camp. He was employed as shift boss on the Hollinger Mine staff previous to the fire. He then went to the Dome Mine as mine captain, leaving there to take the position of assistant manager of Premier Diamond Mine, Pretoria, South Africa. A friend of The Advance kindly sends this newspaper two clippings from The Rand Daily Mail in regard to the said accident. The first clipping reads as follows:—

"Capetown, Tuesday, March 22nd, 1931.—Drifting aimlessly before a south-east breeze under reefed mainsail and jib, a deserted Redwing dinghy was found off the breakwater late yesterday afternoon. The owner, Mr. J. Snyman, of the Premier Mine, Pretoria, who went out in it alone at 2.30 p.m., was missing. Mr. Snyman, an elderly man, was a visitor to Capetown, and on Tuesday last he bought the Redwing dinghy No. 7 from a local agent for cash. Three or four times during the week he

was seen, always alone, on Table Bay. Yesterday afternoon he again went out, taking a reef in his mainsail on the advice of a coloured boat attendant. The lookout at the East Pier saw him off the Minerton side of the bay several times during the afternoon. A fresh south-easter was blowing. Shortly after six o'clock the lookout noticed that the Redwing was running before the wind, and through his telescope he saw that although everything was apparently in order on board, the craft was deserted. The port captain sent out the pilot boat to investigate. The pilot boat brought the Redwing into dock, and an examination was made. The police took charge, and are attempting to solve the mystery of Mr. Snyman's disappearance, which is likely to prove as baffling as that of the crew of the Marie Celeste.—Reuter."

The other cutting is from a later issue of The Rand Daily Mail, and reads as follows:—

On Monday, March 23, 1931, while out yachting on Table Bay, Mr. Johan Snyman, son of the Rev. C. J. Snyman and Mrs. Snyman, of Queen's Hotel, Marine Parade, Durban, was accidentally drowned. His loss is deeply regretted by his parents and his brothers and sisters, Mattie, Attie, Christie, Hettie, Japie, Albert and Laura.

Some years ago Johan sent these verses to one of the home circle, and they have been chosen as a fitting epitaph for his unknown grave:—

WHEN?
I live in a western inland,
Afair from the sounding sea,
And I seem to hear its sobbing
And calling aloud for me;
My heart calls out for the ocean
As a hunter for his guest;
I long to lie on its waters
And be lulled in its arms to rest.
I can close my eyes and fancy
That I hear its billows roar
And see its green waves splashing
And plunging upon the shore;
The white foam caps the billow
And the sea birds wheel and cry,
And the cool wind is blowing,
And the ships go sailing by.
Oh! wonderful, mighty ocean,
When shall I ever roam
Where my heart has gone already,
There o'er my ocean home;
When shall I ever wander
Away from this inland west,
And enjoy the calm, dear ocean,
Or rock on thy heaving breast?

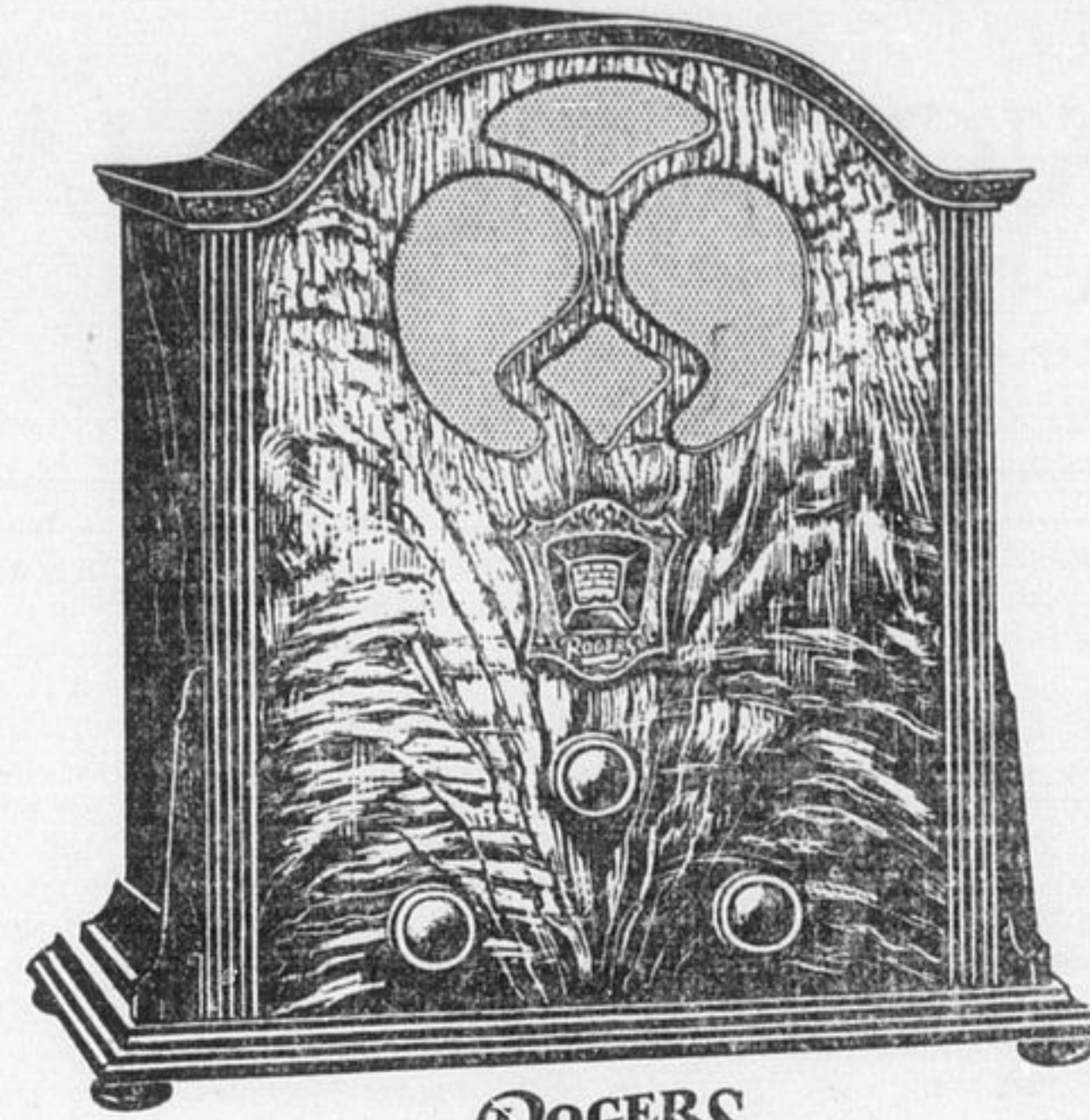

Toronto Lad Caught in North Land Bush

Fifteen-Year-Old Adventurer Captured After Three-Day Hunt Near Temagami. Wanted for Several Theft Charges.

Late on Saturday a young man named Ralph Sharp, about 15 years of age, was captured in the bush near Temagami after a search for three days by provincial officers, not to mention a skilled guide who directed the manhunt through the rocky bush country west of Temagami and northward. Sharp is wanted to face charges of theft. He was eventually taken in charge by Provincial Constable Walker, who is stationed at Temagami, Ont.

According to the despatches in the matter the search for young Sharp began on Thursday of last week when he fled from Constable Walker and his guide, George Guppy, of Temagami, into the bush near Lady Evelyn Lake, in the Temagami forest reserve. Equipped with only a compass and maps of the district, Sharp climbed through the back window of a cabin at Matawapika Falls, and led the constable a chase through the bush that only ended Saturday.

A companion of Sharp, Albert Arnott, aged 16, of Toronto, was captured on Thursday, being taken into custody at the cabin from which Sharp escaped. The two were on a canoe trip from Temagami to Matachewan when the pursuit commenced, and are said to have hiked their way from Toronto about one month ago.
