Quiet Clean-up Here Under the Liquor Act

Fifteen or More Cases to be Before Court of Alleged Blindpigs and Other Illegal Places.
For some time past Chief H. Jones and his staff have been carrying on a quiet campaign to clean-up the illicit liquor selling in town and also to stop other forms of illegality that have gained some standing here in recent years. Chief Jones believes that the Ontario Liquor Control Act is a good law and a fair one and that there should be special effort made to ensure its proper enforcement. Complaints have been frequent to the police in regard to drunkenness and illegal liquor selling being carried on at certain places in town, and the police have been making every effort by means of raids and otherwise to do away with these places.
Through efforts recently made a number of these places will be closed now. It is understood that the police now have fifteen or more charges to come before the court for illegal sale of liquor, illegal possession of liquor and other infractions of the liquor laws. Disorderly houses and gambling places are also under the ban, Chief Jones having the belief that all these places are an injury to the town as well as contrary to law. It is intended not only to stop infractions of the law, but to keep them stopped.
