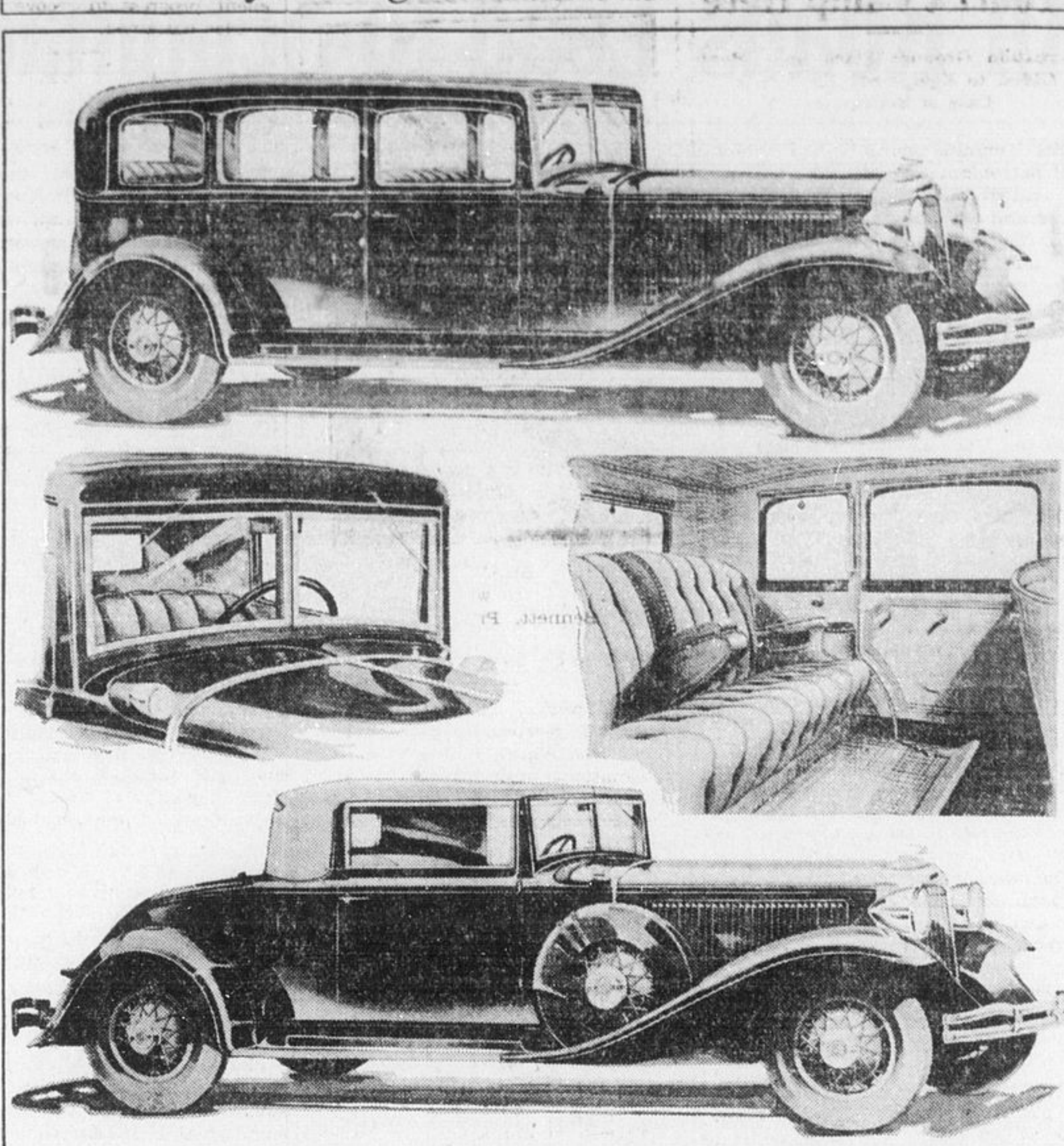

HARDEST BRIDGE PROBLEM SOLVED BY A CANADIAN

At the present time bridge experts seem to be generally agreed that standardization of contract bidding is greatly to be desired. In The Bridge World, the recognized world authority on bridge, there was a recent editorial in which it is stated that "for many months there have been evidences that the movement for standardization on the basis of the Culbertson (approach-forcing) system was gaining tremendous headway." Reference is made also to the fact that standardization has been adopted by leading players and teachers of bridge. "This national, and in fact, world-wide standardization has come not through the authorities but in spite of them. It is a development that has been forced by the contract players of the United States, of Canada, of Great Britain and of the world. Once they have understood the simplicity and accuracy of the Culbertson Standard system, their acceptance of its principles as a guide to contract bidding has been well high universal."

It is interesting to note that Dr. E. L. Roberts, of Timmins, who has won prizes and distinction at bridge, uses and endorses the Culbertson system. To The Advance Dr. Roberts said he believed its general adoption would greatly increase the interest and popularity of bridge. Mr. Ely Culbertson, who has been lecturing in Canada and the United States on the Culbertson Standard system has met with enthusiasm and interest from coast to coast. In every city visited the newspapers have devoted columns of space to accounts of his lectures and explanations of his system. The Vancouver, British Columbia, Star had an interview with Mr. Culbertson in which he paid tribute to British bridge players. He also noted that Canada was showing special interest in bridge. "Incidentally," he said, "the hardest bridge problem ever published was solved by a Canadian, Dr. Roberts, of a small Ontario town." Discussing Canadian bridge, Mr. Culbertson voiced the opinion that Canadian representatives will participate in the next championship in the United States.
