

### Senate Condemns Work of Communists

Bill Given Second Reading in Regard to Registering All Aliens. Communism Creating Ill-Will by Evil Propaganda.

In the Senate last week communism and its evil propaganda was roundly scored by several speakers. The occasion for these speeches was the bill introduced by Senator Casgrain to register all aliens in the Dominion of Canada. This bill was advanced another step towards becoming law. The bill was given its second reading and this week will be considered by a special committee.

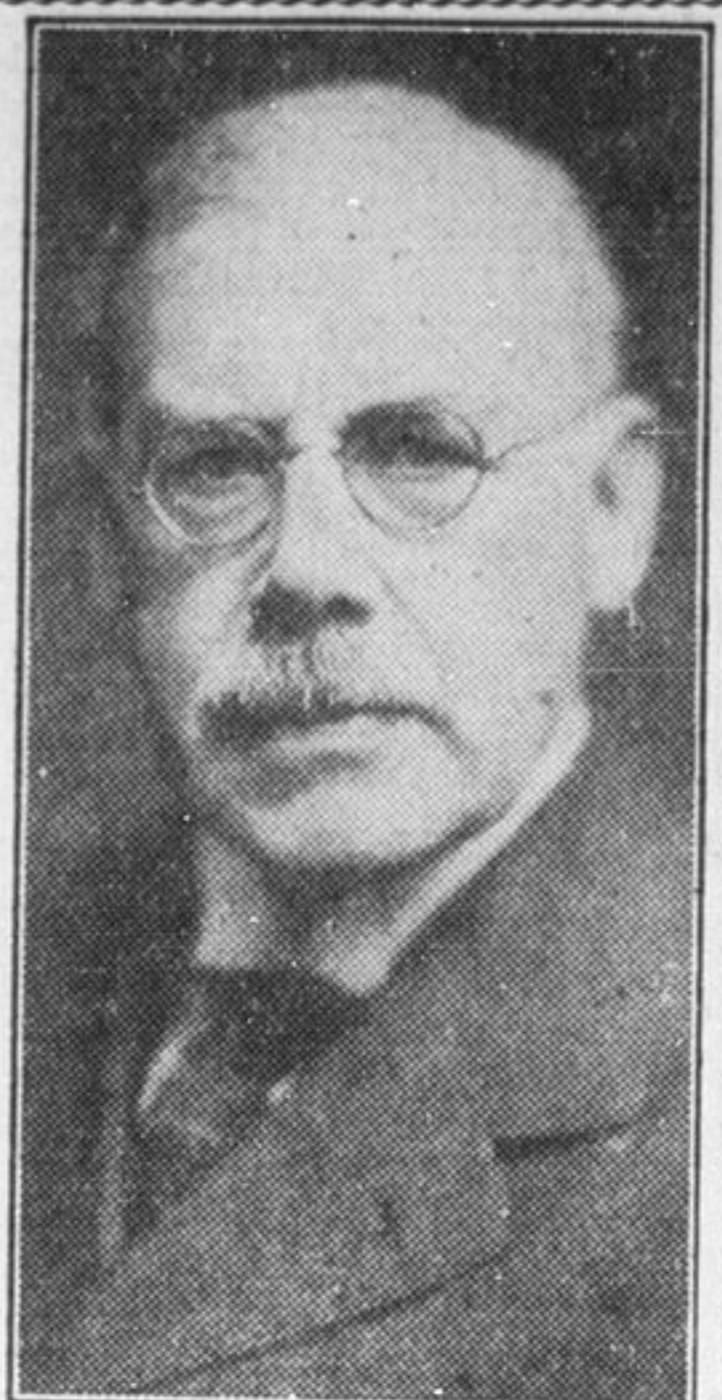
In speaking to the bill, Senator Beaubien, one of the supporters of the measure, had caustic words for communism and the foreigners who promulgated this evil doctrine. Even in the conservative province of Quebec communism had obtained a foothold, said Senator C. P. Beaubien. The Archbishop of Montreal had found it necessary to denounce it, and during the past term of the criminal courts in Montreal five communists had been convicted of openly inciting sedition.

While the bill received a good measure of support, Senator James Donnelly did not see how it would combat communism. Many aliens came here to become good citizens and the legislation would make them feel they were looked on with suspicion. The deportation provisions of the Immigration Act were sufficient to deal with agitators.

Communists were the least of Canada's worries, said Senator James Donnelly. He regarded the whole discussion as unfortunate and thought the Senate might better occupy its time in trying to improve the conditions which led men to accept communistic doctrines. Personally, he favoured the re-

gistration of aliens, but thought citizens of the United States should be exempt.

Throughout Canada there will be a tendency on the part of thoughtful, loyal people to applaud the stand taken by such senators as Senator Casgrain and Senator Beaubien. There will be inclination on the part of most to consider that Senator Donnelly and Senator Murdoch were thinking more of politics than of the welfare of the Dominion. The argument that loyal aliens would resent registration is all pure bunkum. Canadians were supposed not to resent the registration forced upon them this month by the census. If the senators did not worry about loyal Canadians having to register in the past week or two, why should there be any fierce outcry if a few foreigners have to give information for the benefit and safety of the public. It will be found that the loyal foreign element will see nothing but advantage in the proposed registration. The only objectors to the registration will be the "reds" among the foreigners and a few radicals in both houses. Senator Murdoch is right enough in saying that the whole discussion now going on in regard to communism is unfortunate. It certainly is—for the communists. They have been set in their place and no doubt the new legislation introduced in the senate will further add to the proper curbing of these ungrateful cowardly and stupid aliens who have been striving so earnestly to stir up trouble.

### Sudbury Young Men Building Airships

Great Activity Reported Among the Young Men of the Sudbury District as to the First to Complete Home-made Airships.

Fashions change—even in the Sudbury district. Just a little while ago the old men there were dreaming dreams and the young men were trying to make home-made radios. Some of the dreams proved to be nightmares, and some of the radios were about the same. Now, however, the youth of Sudbury have dropped the radio game. Now it is airships that they are seeking to construct. According to recent information from Sudbury there are at least seven young men in that city and district who are striving at this moment to build workable airships. There is reason to believe that some of them will succeed. Indeed, there may be several of them successful in this line. Enough of them made radios to make Amos and Andy weary and the public the same. Several weeks ago reporters around Sudbury learned that two of the young men of the new city of Sudbury were building a plane that they expected to be the first ever made in the North Land. These two young men were students at the Sudbury technical

school. After the announcement of the two students and their hopes it was said that five or six others were attempting the same thing. The seven or eight would-be builders of Sudbury airships were credited with racing each other in the idea of seeing which would be the real claimant for the title of being the first North Land man to build the first North Land airship. At the present moment it would appear as if the honour will go to Stanley Baxter, McKim township, near Sudbury. Mr. Baxter, who is 30 years old, is employed by the telephone company on test switchboard at Sudbury. He is a married man, but has some spare time nevertheless, and this leisure he has been employing wisely and well. More than a year ago he commenced the work of building an airship all on his own, and his job is about completed now. Indeed, he hopes to have a completed airship ready for its initial flight within the next week or two. He is likely to beat his half-dozen rivals in the race for honours as the first to successfully launch on the northern air a North Land airship made by a North Land mechanic in this North Land.

### RED RUSSIAN INVASION ON CARROTS IN CANADA

One form of Red Russian invasion has already reached Canada according to information sent out by the Dominion Department of Agriculture in its bulletin service. A recent bulletin received by The Advance says:—

"Some curious interesting facts are associated with the work of the Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture and among these is included the steady spread to the West and South of the carrot rust fly (Psila rosae Fab.). This insect is of European origin, having been first described many years ago from Bessarabia in southwestern Russia. It has been a serious vegetable pest in Northern Europe for a long period, and has been known in Eastern Canada for nearly half a century. It is spreading slowly west and south and in Canada has reached the Lake Superior region. It is one of the most difficult of soil-inhabiting insects to control and has been the subject of study on two continents for years. There are two generations of these flies each year and injury to the carrot crop is caused by the maggots from the eggs laid by these flies, which bore into the young carrot early in June and again into the more mature root early in October. Two methods of control are found useful. First the cultural method of late planting so that seedlings do not appear above ground before June 10, and of early harvesting, before September 15. The second method of control is the application of corrosive sublimate as an insecticide applied at the time of egg laying in the life cycle of the fly. The solution used is one ounce to ten gallons of water. This mixture is used to thoroughly saturate the soil around the young seedlings."

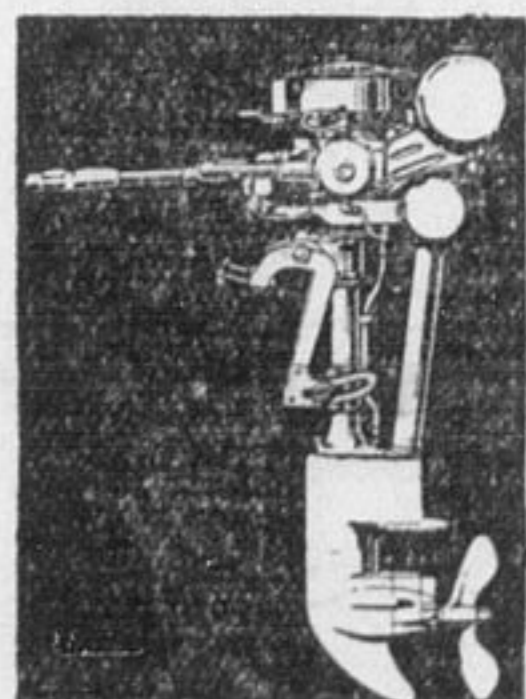
