"Whereas the recent malicious Communist activities have created much ill-feeling and odious publicity;

"And, whereas the Finnish Communists in this country have by their loud conduct and much tongue-wagging cast an unpleasant reflection upon all Finns in Canada, making us appear to the mace-loving citizens of Canada as an undesirable and dangerous ele-

"Be it therefore resolved that this mass meeting of the loyal Finns, held in the Finnish United Church, Kirkland Lake, on May 31st, 1931, denounce in no uncertain terms this communistic activity as anarchistic deception.

"Also, that we organize in Kirkland Lake a society which would be a branch of the new national "Organization of Loyal Finns in Canada," with the aim t.f. of uniting all law-abiding Finns in Canada to fight every form of lawless




