### Loyal Finns Start Society at Kirkland

Attempt by Communists Fails to Upset Plans. Resolution of Loyalty to Canada and Condemnation of Communism Passed by Meeting.

Several weeks ago The Advance made reference to the organization here of the loyal Finns of the town and district. These good citizens for a considerable time had suffered because of the activities of the communists who had acted so indecently that there was danger of the people of Canada turning against all of foreign birth. The Finnish people here who are loyal to this country and good citizens of Canada, wished to place themselves on record, and the resolution of loyalty that they passed at their meeting here pleased all loyal Canadians who were glad to have this sincere expression of good will from fellow citizens. At the time The Advance mentioned that the loyal Finns all through Canada were organizing to protect themselves and their adopted country of Canada against the brutal menace of communism and atheism of the ignorant. Kirkland Lake loyal Finns have now organized. A group of the agitators from Timmins went down to Kirkland Lake to attempt to upset the plans of the loyal Finns, but their evil work was not successful. They struck against a group that was able to make the silly agitators look as foolish as they are, and their unprincipled tricks were unavailing for their evil purposes. The Advance suggests that all loyal people read the following account of the organization of the loyal Finns at Kirkland Lake, as given in the last issue of The Northern News:—

#### Loyal Finns Form Society in Kirkland Lake

To cast off the oppressive Communist influence and clean their name from that slur, an organization has been progressing in recent years in Canada among the Finnish people who, while retaining a strong affection for their native land, are decidedly loyal and respect the laws of the country. With a large Finnish population in Kirkland Lake, a branch of the "Loyal Finns of Canada," whose headquarters are in Toronto, has been formed here and will be known as the "Kirkland Lake Finnish National Society."

There are about 80,000 Finns in Canada, and fully one per cent. of that number live in Kirkland Lake. The last three years have seen a real awakening among the Finns in Canada and locally the Finns are no exception, but have experienced in a real sense this new awakening. "The Finnish Organization" was for years the only social organization. Though Communist, this organization has sometimes been held up before the Canadians as a religious institution. Though claiming to speak the "voice of the people," its membership in this camp is understood to be something less than two per cent. of the whole Finnish population. The Finnish United Church was organized less than three years ago, and has grown in importance and strength.

#### Block First Meeting

The first step was taken when a mass meeting of all loyal Finns was called on May 24th at the Finnish Church. The expected thing happened. Long before the appointed time the Communists filled the Church to its capacity, before too many loyal people would have time to come. Those who came on time had to stay on the steps outside. The purpose of the Communists was, with the help of their comrades from Timmins and South Porcupine of whom large numbers had come down, to crush the attempt of the loyal Finns to organize themselves in town. But their efforts to "steal" the meeting were frustrated from the very beginning, and, aside from the usual communistic gesticulation it was closed in perfect order. Their objective was a total failure.

A meeting was called for the following Sunday, May 31st, to further discuss the project. Over sixty people were present, and before the meeting was over the new society was launched, with forty charter members. The meeting was opened by Rev. E. A. Kyllonen with a short address, outlining the reasons why this meeting had been called and why such an organization of the loyal Finns in this town was needed. When the meeting had elected H. Sankelo as chairman and J. Hinnala as secretary, it was thrown open for free discussion. The enthusiasm with which a large number of those present spoke showed that the proceedings had their full approval.

#### Pass Resolution

This enthusiasm broke out into a stormy applause after the following resolution was read, and passed unanimously:—

"Whereas the recent malicious Communist activities have created much ill-feeling and odious publicity; and, whereas the Finnish Communists in this country have by their loud conduct and much tongue-wagging cast an unpleasant reflection upon all Finns in Canada, making us appear to the peace-loving citizens of Canada as an undesirable and dangerous element;

"Be it therefore resolved that this mass meeting of the loyal Finns, held in the Finnish United Church, Kirkland Lake, on May 31st, 1931, denounce in no uncertain terms this communistic activity as anarchistic deception. "Also, that we organize in Kirkland Lake a society which would be a branch of the new national "Organization of Loyal Finns in Canada," with the aim of uniting all law-abiding Finns in Canada to fight every form of lawless

#### NEW POSTAL RATES THAT WENT INTO EFFECT JULY 1ST

Changes authorized by the Bennett budget in the rates of letter postage were scheduled to go into effect on July 1st (yesterday). The new rates are as follows:—

For local delivery—Two cents first ounce; one cent each additional ounce. For all other offices in Canada—Three cents first ounce; two cents each additional ounce.

Great Britain, places within the British Empire, France, United States, and all other places in North and South America—Three cents first ounce; two cents each additional ounce.

Other countries—Five cents first ounce; three cents each additional ounce. Post cards—No change.
