Given Thirty Days for Drunk in Auto

Cochrane Man Failed to Return to Scene of Accident, Caught by Good Work of Sgt. Moore. Twenty-seven Other Cases at Court This Week.

Armand Bradette, of Cochrane, was sentenced to thirty days at Halleybury at police court this week on a charge of being drunk in charge of a car. He and Anatole Turpin were in a car that collided with F. Feldman's car, two of the children in the latter car being injured, one little girl being taken to the hospital to have a cut lip sewed. The Cochrane car did not stop at the scene of the accident, but the good work of Sgt. Moore resulted in the arrest of the two men after a lively chase. Turpin was fined \$10.00 and costs for being drunk.

Ell Dubeault and Jos. Lepine were each given three months for being in unlawful possession of burglar's weapons at night. They were found outside a chicken coop on Balsam street, south. Two other men on a similar charge were acquitted.

A man who refused offer of work and was not supporting his family was charged with vagrancy, but the case was remanded till called on to give him chance to straighten away. Another non-support case was remanded to next week.

For not stopping at an intersection a fine of \$1.00 and costs each was imposed on two men while a third was cautioned in this matter.

Eight drunks were fined \$10.00 and costs each, or thirty days, two of them taking the jail term.

A charge of using profane and insulting language was remanded to next week.

Rene Desjardins, as owner of the car concerned, was charged with failing to return to the scene of an accident. The case was adjourned to next week. Jos. Romelski, on the same charge, pleaded guilty, and was fined \$25.00
