Death on Saturday of Robert Sinclair

Prominent and Respected Business Man of Timmins Passes Away. Funeral This Week with Masonic and Orange Order Honours.

Timmins lost a worthy business man and a highly-esteemed citizen in the death on Saturday last of R. Sinclair. Fourth Avenue, who for the past six years has conducted a large cleaning, pressing and dyeing service here. Mr. Sinclair had not been in the best of health for a year or more past, but was around at business until a couple of weeks ago when it was necessary to remove him to the hospital for an operation for appendicitis. The operation was successfully carried through and last week he appeared to be making progress to recovery, but his heart was affected, and though well enough to receive visitors during the day, he passed away on Saturday afternoon about six o'clock, lesion of the heart being the cause of death.

The late Robert Sinclair was over 69 years of age, being born at Quebec City on June 20th, 1862, of Scottish parentage. He was the second oldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Sinclair. When he was about three years of age he family moved to Ottawa where his father was on the staff of the House of Commons until his death. The late Robert Sinclair married Francis Elrth on Aug. 16th, 1882, and the good couple were looking forward recently to the golden jubilee of their happy marriage. The event that would have been observed next year had the hand of death not intervened. In addition to the sadly bereaved widow, two daughters, Mrs. F. Garner and Miss Betty Sinclair, and one son, J. H. Sinclair, in Vancouver, are left to mourn the loss of one very dear to them. Two sisters, Mrs. T. D. MacFarlane, Ottawa, and Mrs. Dr. Macklin, Goderich, and one brother, Walter, also survive. To these and to the other near relatives and friends the sincere sympathy of all will go out.

The late Robert Sinclair spent practically all his life in the dyeing and cleaning business and had built up a big business here in that line. He had carried on his work as an expert in these lines in Winnipeg, Ottawa, Toronto and Timmins. He came to Timmins in 1925 and he had been prominent in many circles here, enjoying the highest regard of all.

The funeral took place on Tuesday morning from his late residence to St. Matthew's church where service was conducted by Rev. R. S. Cushing. The funeral was under Masonic and Orange Lodge orders, the late Mr. Sinclair being a valued member of both orders. The Masons conducted their own services at the house, while the Orangemen held their service at the station before the body was taken to Toronto for interment in Mount Pleasant cemetery. The pall-bearers were:—S. G. Fowler, F. M. Wallingford, W. F. McLean, Gordon Thompson, Thos. Neal, W. Isnor. The Masonic and Orange Lodges attended the funeral here in a body and in addition there were large numbers of friends and acquaintances to pay their last marks of respect to a man who held the regard of all. The large number of floral offerings testified to the esteem in which the late Mr. Sinclair was held and the sympathy felt for those bereaved. At Toronto the funeral was under Masonic honours on Wednesday at 2 p.m., interment being made at Mount Pleasant cemetery.

To Decide Attitude on Road to Timmins

Meeting Called in Sudbury to Discuss the Proposed Belt Line of Roads for the North Land.

A despatch from Sudbury on Tuesday says:—
"The attitude to be adopted in regard to the proposed highway from Sudbury to Timmins and the aspect to be stated at the organization meeting of a Northern Ontario council scheduled for August 25 at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., will be the main items under discussion at a meeting of the Sudbury Board of Trade to be held on Friday night at the city hall, according to J. A. Laberge to-day.

"The construction of a motor road from Sudbury to Timmins was supported by city council recently, on motion of Ald. W. J. Laforest. The road would be approximately 150 miles long, as compared with the present route of 367 miles through North Bay and up the Ferguson highway. The suggested road would pass through the Matachewan and Shining Tree mining district and besides opening up valuable timber country and farming areas, would give immediate employment to unemployed this winter.

"Mr. Laberge stated that the suggestion has been made for the route to parallel the Hydro power transmission line now being built from Huntta to Copper Cliff and, according to information given by engineers who have been over the power line location, believe only 15 per cent. new right of way would have to be cut.

"Also, the present winter would be opportune because Hydro construction camps could be utilized and advantage taken by the provincial Government of the Dominion unemployment relief grant. A definite stand will be adopted and later presented to Government authorities at Toronto, by an organized body from Northern Ontario. The proposed road would form a loop with the Ferguson highway and result in it being a tourist attraction.

"The attitude of executive members of the Sudbury Board of Trade is favourable to the Sault Ste. Marie meeting and it is possible that delegates will be appointed to accompany Mayor Peter Fenton and Ald. W. J. Laforest, official representatives for city council. A motion passed at a recent meeting of aldermen supported the proposed Northern Ontario council."
