Duck-Hunting May be Banned This Year

Plan Proposed for Cancellation or Curtailment of the Duck Season in Canada and the United States.

A despatch from Ottawa this week says:—
The duck-hunters, those persistent men, who are up with the sun on the

could fall mornings waiting for the "broadbills" and the "whistlers" to swoop down among their decoys, may be out of luck this autumn. A move is on foot in Canada and United States to have no open season for ducks this fall, or at most, only a very few weeks.

Officials from Washington have been in Ottawa talking the situation over with the representatives of the Parks Branch of the Department of Interior, and have returned to advise President Hoover. Dr. Harrison F. Lewis, Chief Migratory Bird Officer for Ontario and Quebec, has received instructions from Hon. Thomas Murphy, Minister of Interior, to interview the chief game officials of the Provinces of Eastern Canada, to explain the critical situation to them and decide how far Canada will be prepared to go in the matter when discussions with Washington are renewed.

The drought in Saskatchewan, and to a less degree in the other Prairie Provinces, is responsible for the situation. Wild ducks are happily unconcerned with laws of citizenship and immigration. Most of them on this continent are born in Canada and die in the United States. This summer a calamity befell the Prairie ducks. They arrived in their accustomed breeding grounds to find their favourite water-courses dried up. Many of the birds died, and many others, although they survived, reared no brood of ducklings, according to reports coming in to the department.

Accordingly, only a comparatively few Prairie ducks will return south this autumn. The black ducks which breed in Eastern Canada have had a fairly good year, and will go south in about normal numbers, but it is feared that if the thousands of hunters concentrate on the black ducks they will be very nearly exterminated as well. So it is proposed to cut the open season this year to the minimum, or wipe it out altogether for this year.
