Memories of Days of Fifty Years Ago

Interesting Old Magazine Gives Review of the Year 1887. When Alfonso XIII was Christened, President Cleveland and Bride.

Some days ago R. F. Wear, of Timmings, was kind enough to give The Advance a copy of Frank Leslie's Illustrated Family Almanac for 1887.

The magazine is profusely illustrated, and though printing had not in 1887 achieved the wonders that it has in modern times, the illustrations are beautifully done.

An article on American commerce with Canada says that the United States exports to Canada had a value of \$34,112,252.00 while Canada's imports into the United States totaled \$36,695,685.00.

The statement is made that "telephoning from St. Petersburg to Boulogne, a distance of 2,465 miles, had been accomplished."

An article headed, "The Anarchist Murder of Police in Chicago" suggests that the Chicago of 1887 was much the same in some ways as the city of to-day.

A short item describes the death of Francis Liszt, the famous composer, while there is a much larger article on the marriage of President Grover Cleveland.

There is not an uninteresting page in the magazine and it is especially interesting after the passage of 44 years.

Sun Spots Indicated Hot Weather This Year

A correspondent writing this week from Elk Lake to The Advance says:—Wm. Garvey, of the Ashley-Garvey Gold Mines, was in town last week on his way home from Timmings.

Dan O'Connor was in town last week from Connaught and stopped at the Stanley Hotel. There he met H. A. Preston, who has known Dan since 1902.

H. A. Preston says he has been studying the spots on the sun every year since 1920 with his powerful glasses. During 1922 the sun was one quarter covered with a jet black, and each year since there have been several small spots to be seen.

The general showing of vegetables at the flower and vegetable show on Monday interested and delighted all. As will be noted by the prize list elsewhere in this issue there were splendid examples of practically every class of vegetables from beans to potatoes and back to vegetable marrows.

Two specially interesting collections of vegetables were the displays of vegetables by I. P. Wilson, Golden City, and M. J. Tinkess, Timmings.

Mr. Wilson's exhibit included:—potatoes, carrots, beets, Swede turnips, onions, cauliflowers, tomatoes (ripe and green), peas, wax beans, dwarf beans, green rhubarb, pumpkin, Hubbard squash, cucumber (outdoors), lettuce, vegetable marrow (green and white), Wortz varieties, scallop squash, Brussels sprouts, celery, cabbage (several varieties).

Mr. Tinkess had on equally impressive collection and people in general spent a lot of their time admiring this collection of Timmings-grown vegetables of the finest quality.

The whole display of vegetables on Monday may well be taken as a striking proof of the possibilities of this immediate district in the growing of vegetables of high standard.

After being idle since November 20, 1930, the newsprint mill of the Abitibi Power and Paper Co. in the Sault started at eight o'clock this morning.

Some 400 men were engaged at work in the mill last week. The men have been taken on in gradually increasing numbers ever since the announcement that the mill would open.
