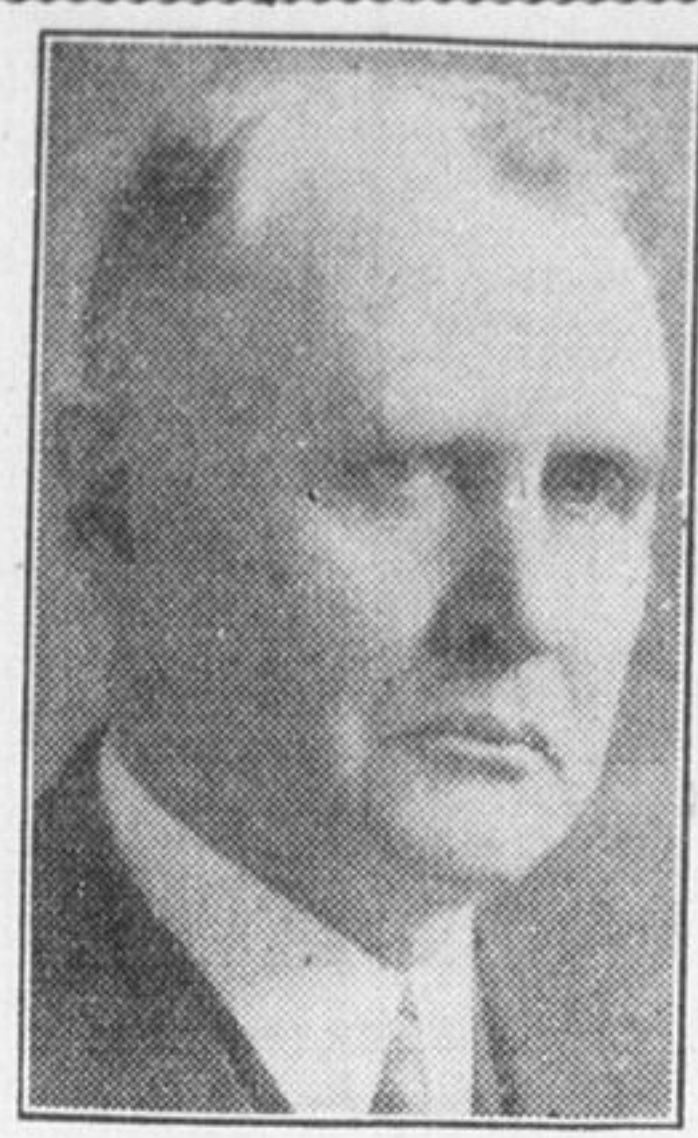
A dainty luncheon was served during the evening and this was one of the pleasant features of a very pleasing evening.

Ben has been prospecting on the Clearwater Lake claims for some time past and the find now reported is one of the good things discovered. Non-resident British subjects must pay \$75 for a license for which aliens are charged \$150. Residents of the territories pay the nominal fee of two dollars.
