Six Months Each for Communist Leaders

Two of the Rioters at Kirkland Lake Given Stiff Terms. Clean-up of Disturbers of the Peace at Kirkland Lake.

At Kirkland Lake on Thursday morning last Magistrate Atkinson had three of the men before him in connection with the recent riot at Kirkland Lake in which several policemen were assaulted, windows smashed and other damage done, the disorder arising from the refusal of a group of communists to obey police orders as to the holding of one of their meetings. The previous week at the Kirkland Lake police court, six men were sentenced to two months each in jail. The three others, giving the names of John Boychuk, Joe Billings and Jalo Keola, were remanded to last week. On Thursday two of them were sentenced to six months in jail with hard labour. The other escaped with a fine of \$100.00 and costs or two months' imprisonment. The three were charged with obstructing the police.

According to despatches from Kirkland Lake on Thursday last, John Boychuk and Joe Billings were the two men sentenced to imprisonment. Evidence given the previous week showed that they had formed the definite plan of obstructing the police and urging their hearers to do likewise, the magistrate thought. This pair had organized the demonstration, and despite police warnings, had attempted to hold it at a downtown intersection. Stones had begun to fly at the police the riot terminating only after a half-hour's struggle, with several store windows shattered and policemen injured. Billings was recognized as a former Sudbury Communist, who was fined there last year for his part in a street fray, although then appearing under the name of Billinsky. While refusing to acknowledge his identity, Billings would not deny the record produced. Keola was the driver of the truck which Boychuk and Billings used as a platform from which to address the crowd. While obeying the initial police order to move on, the truck had returned to the scene to accommodate the speakers. In view of Keola's youth and the fact that he was a married man with a family, Magistrate Atkinson took a lenient view of his case.

Alexander Case Now Close to a Record

Legal Dispute Over Kapuskasing Accident at Another Stage. Case to be Before the Courts Again at Early Date.

A despatch this week from Cochrane says:—"With the long drawn out legal dispute between Sayed Alexander, former Kapuskasing merchant, and the C.N.R. entering upon another phase to make it four trials and three appeals, this litigation bids fair to establish a unique record for Canadian courts. Last week, an appeal by Alexander from a decision of a Supreme Court jury at Cochrane, in which his claim for \$20,000 damages from the railway was dismissed about a year ago, was to have come before the court at Osgoode Hall, but owing to the illness of his lawyer, the case was adjourned and set at the foot of the list. It will come up again in the near future.

Creighton Mine Man Attacked by Thug

Old Man Has Skull Fractured but Crawls Two Miles to Police, Search Being Made for the Thug Responsible.

Ontario Provincial and International Nickel Company police are scouring the country around Creighton Mine for an unknown man who hit Alex Braka, Creighton Mine workman, over the head with an axe, fracturing his skull and causing other serious wounds. The motive is believed to have been robbery. Braka is an old man, living alone in a small shack on the outskirts of the village of Creighton Mine. His antipathy to savings banks is well known, and as he has always lived frugally, it is popularly believed that he has a considerable sum of money hidden in his house. About midnight on Monday of this week a stranger knocked at his door, seeking, he said, a night's shelter. He had no grips, but told a plausible story of leaving a suitcase containing some liquor on the road about two miles out of town. Braka agreed to accompany him back for the suitcase with a light. On the pretext that they might meet a bear, which are plentiful in that district, the stranger carried an axe. About two miles out of town the stranger suddenly, without warning, struck Braka over the head with the axe. Though his skull was fractured by the blow, Braka grappled with his assailant, and succeeded in wresting the axe from him. The stranger took to his heels in the direction of the village. Afraid to walk back along the road for fear of being ambushed, Braka struck across country to the village, through dense bush and across a swamp. It took him more than three hours to cover the two miles, and at half past four in the morning, he fell exhausted and almost unconscious at the door of the Creighton Mine police station. Rushed to the International Nickel Company's hospital, it was found he suffered from a fractured skull, badly lacerated scalp and a number of other injuries. It is believed that the stranger intended to kill the old man and search his house at his leisure for the money supposed to be hidden there. Braka was able to give a fairly good description of the man, though he had never seen him in daylight.
