## Harvest Services at South Porcupine

Ven. Archdeacon Woodall Conducts Attractive Services at Anglican Church, South Porcupine, Other South Porcupine News.

South Porcupine, Ont., Sept. 30th, 1931. Special to The Advance.

The Tisdale township council met at their regular meeting on Monday evening with the reeve and all the councillors present. The first part of the evening was taken up mostly with the discussion of various tax problems. A man on whose premises a business has recently been opened wanted reduction in his taxes owing to the time the place had been untenanted. A partial reduction of this year's taxes were granted. Another building untenanted for two years also had its taxes reduced. A man who had bought two houses, built here in the rush of earlier days, and who had knocked one down to fix the other, had some consideration given him seeing he is at present just the possessor of one house. The industry of a one-armed settler of North Tisdale was highly commended and he was given some relief on his taxes. It was decided to see about disposing of some saleable lots the township has on hand and thus raise some money on them. A charity case where a husband was in the hospital and the wife had three or four small children was considered a needy case at present. Another case was that of a man of foreign birth who had been in the country nearly twenty years, and had a family here. Work had been obtained for him. It was remarked that the country should not be considered responsible for any who become a public charge if same were not naturalized citizens. Nine houses

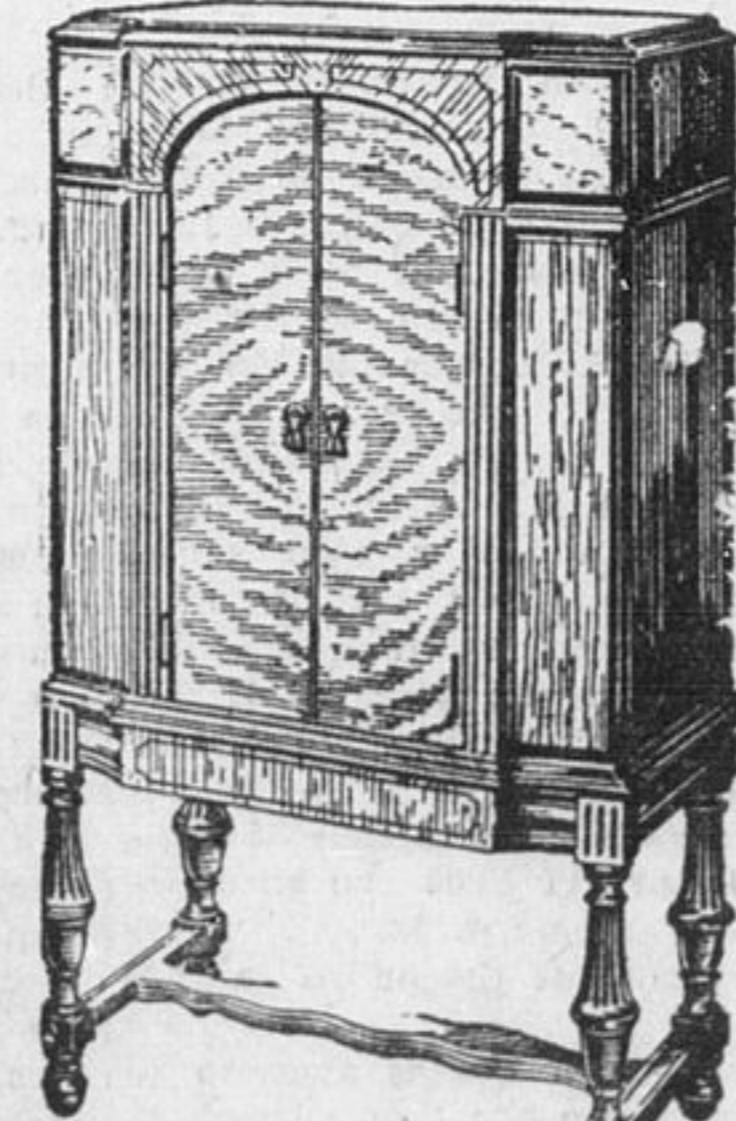

also to be finished soon. A sidewalk on a block of Moore street from Commercial to Dome South Porcupine is to be made out of the best planks taken from Schumacher streets where cement walks have been made, but new stringers are to be obtained. A new stretch of cement walk for Schumacher was discussed, it being necessary to decide what outlet would be made for surface water in the spring before some of the property owners on the street would sign for cement walks. Some kind of shelter for some of our unemployed here was discussed. A large building on which there were a lot of back taxes owing was maintained as a probable place the rent of same to be applied on taxes. An effort is being made to get the government of the province to provide food if necessary here the same as has been done in Cochrane until such time as some kind of employment can be obtained. Tenders are to be asked, for the further waterworks extensions to be made in Schumacher. The routine accounts and wages were passed for payment.

The Harvest Home services were held in the Church of England here on Sunday last, the service being taken by Rev. Archdeacon Woodall. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion with autumn leaves, fruits vegetables and grains as well as an abundance of autumn flowers. Never has it looked better. Mrs. Reynolds sang very sympathetically, "I come to Thee". Afterwards the flowers were sent to the Porcupine hospital and the fruits and vegetables were taken out to the Children's Shelter at Timmins. Mr. M. Smith, Sr., for many years a warden of the church donated a fine alms plate which was graciously received by Archdeacon Woodall for the use of the church.

### SISCOE SAID TO RUNNING ORE AVERAGING \$7 A TON

A despatch this week from Amos, Que., says:—"Siscoe Gold Mines is carrying out an extensive development campaign, with work largely confined to the western ore system on the various levels from 150 to 600 feet respectively. Cross-cutting and drifting operations are steadily opening up an ore zone carrying good values in gold. Recent assays from the section are said to average from \$15 to \$20 to the ton, according to information from the pro-
