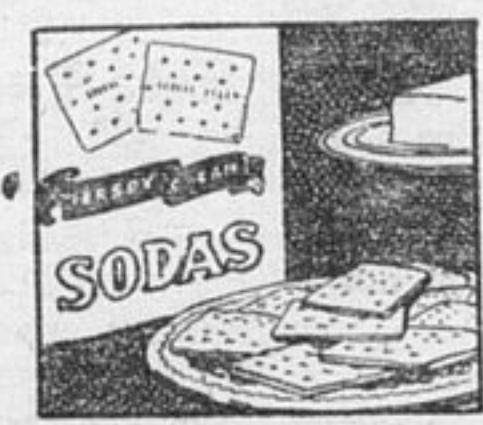

Dome and McIntyre Stopped by the Dark

Mr. A. Thornton, who so ably guarded the citadel of the Porcupine hockey team four years ago, is in camp with the construction company from Kirkland Lake that have the contract for renewing the tarvia road between here and Timmins. His old friends were glad to see him.

Mr. J. McCrea, of the Dome Mines, is receiving the congratulations of friends on the arrival of a young son last week. Mrs. McCrea (nee Dorothy Dowsett) and the boy are both doing well at St. Michael's hospital in Toronto.

What was to have been a final game between these teams was played between Dome Mines and McIntyre football teams on Saturday last, but darkness intervened before the game was finished and there is to be another at the Dome Mines on October 7th before the winner of the Dickson cup is declared. In Saturday's game at Timmins the Dome were leading 2-1 when the game was called by referee Larmer. By that time nothing much could be seen by the spectators except occasionally the shiny pate of some bald-headed player. The teams lined up:—McIntyre—goal, McWhinnie; backs, Connor and Edgell; half-backs, O'Donnell, Stewart and Hill; forwards, Gray, Summers, Tattersall, Callaghan and Chalmers. Dome Mines—goal, Baxter; backs, McGuire and Blair; half-backs, T. Blair, Crawford, Munro; forwards, Gardiner, Jones, J. Whyte, Cook and Rudkin. Referee, P. Larmer of Timmins. The first goal was made by the Dome after about fifteen minutes of play, mostly in mid-field. Jones kicked for the goal but McWhinnie fumbled the ball then lost it and before he got it cleared Jones was in ahead of him and passed out to Gardiner who lifted it to just inside the bar on the upper left hand corner of the net. There was no more scoring during this period. McWhinnie had five stops to make for Baxter's four as the Dome had much the stronger edge on the play. Right from the kick-off the McIntyre went into the second half with more pep. Five minutes of aggressive work brought its reward when Gray outsped Munro down the line and although the ball went dead, from the throw in it was kept close to Baxter till a play started by Gray was finished by Callaghan scoring neatly. But the jubilation of the Mac's supporters was short-lived for with about another five minutes gone, Gardiner lifted the pigskin to Jones who passed it on to Whyte. McWhinnie cleared the first shot but through a tangle of legs Whyte got back another that beat him, putting the Dome again into the lead. There were several dangerous rushes on the Dome goal but, the two backs did very effective work, lightening Baxter's task. He stopped seven in this half to McWhinnie's ten.
