

### Council Meeting at South Porcupine

Many Matters Before Tiedale Council at Regular Session. Other Items of Interest from South Porcupine Correspondent.

South Porcupine, Ont., Oct. 13th, 1931. Special to The Advance.

Among the visitors at Kirkland Lake over the holiday were Messrs Lightbody, Honer, and E. Jones.

The Thanksgiving service at the United Church was exceptionally well attended, there not being seating capacity for all who wished to attend. The choir's rendition of "Praise Ye the

Lord" was much appreciated. Rev. L. Hussey's talk was very appropriate for the day and was listened to most attentively. The church was decorated with autumn leaves, flowers, fruits, vegetables, grain and vines. Many remarked it had never been more beautiful.

The Jolly Juniors (girls) are meeting for the first time this season at 4.15 on Thursday. The C.G.I.T. meet for the first at seven the same evening. The Young People's Society have their work all planned for the term. Mr. W. Andrews is again president and there has been a very pleasing interest evinced in the two meetings that have been held. This week they are attending the Young People's Rally at Schumacher, but if their songs and yells are given with the gusto with which they were practised, you will likely know they were there before this is in print.

Tiedale township council met in their chambers on Tuesday of this week instead of Monday. Reeve Gallagher and all the councillors were present. The minutes of the last regular and a special meeting were read. The special meeting was on October 3rd and was in connection with the waterworks extensions. L. Mascioli received the contract for Schumacher. There was not much correspondence. A letter from J. E. Ellis re unemployment relief was received. While not granting the amount which was requested as a whole for this work the township were told to send in monthly bills. These are to be paid on the ratio of:—the Province one-third, the Dominion one-third and the municipality one-third. The action of the Dome Mines in paying ahead of time for a township levy, was very kindly commented upon. It was decid-

ed to get prices on a minimum car lot of waterwork extension requisites. A discussion of sidewalks for the new street in Schumacher took place as a good walk is needed there. A letter of thanks and appreciation was sent the council by a woman who was now comfortable in another part of the province but who had found it necessary to receive help for awhile last year. Mr. Lark wanted permission to join on to the nearest water line to his property in Schumacher and offered to put in the extension at his own expense. A man from First avenue in Schumacher claimed that the street water which he had given right of way to be carried over his property was not properly taken care of there. The engineer said that a catch-basin was already ordered and would be installed as soon as possible. He also thought the manhole was too high out in front of his place. It was a menace to cars. A man owning a lot in a very well located portion of Schumacher felt he was assessed too high but the council seemed to think it worth the full amount. The reeve wanted to offer him a cheque for it at the value he thought it should be assessed but the man was not very anxious for the deal. He also wanted permission to start a bakeshop in certain premises where the chimney was condemned. He promised that the chimney would be properly repaired and water would be installed so permission was granted. The chimney will be later inspected. There was another discussion re the water charges for horse-stables that were becoming more and more horseless. These discussions have nearly reached the point of a "house-d'oeuvre" with the council. The majority of the town fathers voted against changing the sidewalk in Schumacher at a point in the business section where it was claimed the water bothered. There was considerable discussion re the jobs being done on the Dome and Timmins roads. While the Timmins road was mentioned as having too much

shoulder it was stated that there was not shoulder enough on the Dome road. Also on the Dome road the rock dressing had nearly all rolled off into the ditch. It was thought that the oil used was not strong enough to hold this surfacing in place. Of course there had been some strong kicking done about the tar put on two years ago. It was strong enough to "stick" anywhere and especially in unwanted places. The method of putting the rock on top of the dressing had saved such a mess this year if it would only stand the wear. It was decided that all would go and make further examination of these roads before registering further kicks in regard to them. Various other items were discussed and dealt with.

There was quite a docket for last week's police court. Two drunks paid the usual fine; one reckless driver and one case of driving without a permit were both adjourned. There were two charges of speeding, on one of which judgment was reserved and the other was adjourned. A case of having cows at large was withdrawn. In four cases of shooting between Saturday night and Monday morning, two were fined and two were remanded for a week. For assault one man was fined one hundred dollars and costs. A charge of rape was dismissed.

Constable J. W. McCord had two cases in court. That of operating without lights brought down a fine. A case of speeding was remanded one week.

Just before the period closed, Parsons neatly placed a corner kick which Fernie turned into a tally-maker. When play was resumed on even terms both entered into it with real zest. The wind was with the Dome and they simply sailed in, Rudkin taking the lead when he lifted that pigskin in pretty style from well out on his line. A few minutes later he repeated the same feat. Then Jones brought the leather up from midfield and tossed it over to White who netted as trig a goal as one would want to see. Crawford was the next one, who passed the ball along to White, thus making five counts for the Dome. ### Death of Manford Hudson on Tuesday of This Week

Manford Hudson, well-known and highly-regarded in Timmins where he has been a resident for many years past, died at his home, 103 Charles street, on Tuesday of this week. Death was due to silicosis. He had been in poor health for some three years past, spending part of that time in the South for treatment, but being at home for the last fifteen months.

The late Mr. Hudson was a native of Nova Scotia, but had spent a great part of his life in the North. He was thirty-four years old at the time of his death. In addition to the bereaved widow, his mother and two of his brothers and three sisters, are left to mourn his loss. His mother, Mrs. Horace Hudson, resides at the old family home at County Harbour Mines, Nova Scotia. The three sisters, Mrs. Stanley Porter, Mrs. Nick Plouin and Miss Annabel Hudson, also reside there. One brother, Robey, lives at Kirkland Lake, and the other, Charles, resides at County Harbour Mines, N.S. To the widow and other bereaved relatives and friends the sympathy of all will be extended in their loss.

The funeral will take place to-day (Thursday), Rev. Mr. Slade conducting service at the home.
