Many Candidates in Township of Tisdale

Two for Reeveship and Eight on Ballots for Council. Other News from Correspondent at South Porcupine and the Dome.

South Porcupine, Dec. 2nd, 1931. Special to The Advance.

There is an election this year in Tisdale township with contests for both the reeveship and the four places at the council board. The voting will be on Monday next, Dec. 7th, and there should be a large vote. The following are the candidates qualifying and on the ballot:—

For reeve, C. V. Gallagher; David G. Kerr.

For council:—F. D. Dwyer, W. Fairhurst, J. A. Hawkins, Geo. A. Henderson, Fred Laforest, Sylvester Kennedy, W. D. Pearce and J. E. Williams.

The nominations made at South Porcupine on Nomination Day, last Friday, will keep the voters busy selecting a council on Election Day. C. V. Gallagher and D. Kerr are in the field for the reeveship. W. Fairhurst, W. D. Pearce, S. Kennedy and F. Laforest, of South Porcupine, were nominated for councillors, while from Schumacher there were eight nominated, viz:—J. A. Hawkins, and D. Kerr the present councillors, J. E. Williams, James Dillon, W. R. Sullivan, F. Dwyer, E. Villeneuve and G. Henderson. After the nominations closed Mr. James Shewan, of Schumacher, was chosen as chairman for the meeting that followed.

Reeve C. V. Gallagher of the present council was the first called on to speak. He gave a graphic recital of the year's work touching particularly on the unemployment situation. He told of the various means whereby they had endeavoured to get work for the unemployed. In some cases where large companies sent for men for work in the bush they had come back with the story that they could not make enough to clothe themselves, over and above their board; that in one instance they really ran into debt through time lost from bad weather and still having to pay board on such days. What to do with these and many other cases confronting them had been a serious problem for months now. During the year they had succeeded in getting legislation passed that meant the taxes on the non-operating capital of the mines would be payable where the mine was working and not at the location of the head office. McIntyre Mine had moved their head office to Tisdale township some time before this legislation was passed so as to give the municipality the benefit of the tax. Dome had already paid in over seven thousand dollars this year although the tax could not legally be enforced until the Lieutenant-Governor proclaimed the legislation enacted as a law. The taxes of this municipality were high. The fact that only short-time debentures were obtainable for the expenditures in a mining camp made them more so, but it was hoped that the next issue of debentures could be obtained for a longer extension of time as the camp seemed on a more permanent basis now than it had ever been before.

D. Kerr, the other nominee for reeve was not well enough to be present to speak. F. Laforest and J. A. Hawkins said that as the reeve had covered most of the work they did not think there was much for them to say other than to thank the people for nominating them for re-election. J. E. Williams spoke of the difficulties encountered by the present council during its term of office and said that he thought that Tisdale had led among the municipalities of Ontario in their manner of dealing with the unemployed. The others nominated just briefly thanked those who nominated them and promised to do their utmost for the township if elected. W. R. Sullivan, James Dillon and E. Villeneuve were not present to speak. After the other speakers were finished C. V. Gallagher was recalled and spoke re the collection of taxes in Tisdale. He said it was not the duty of the council to collect taxes but just to strike the rate adequate for the expenditure. It was the duty of the tax collector and the treasurer to do the collecting and they had been too lenient in the past. When taxes were not paid which were counted on for expenditures it had been necessary to borrow from the bank. This year the bank had been more strict about loans to them as to others throughout the country with the result that if the township were to carry on taxes must come in when due. Notices were sent out by the collector again and again and no attention paid to them. Hence stricter measures had to be resorted to, in many cases. When questions were called for there was only one asked and as that was of a personal nature the chairman ruled it should be answered by the council in session, not at a general meeting of the kind in progress.

The bazaar and sale of home-baking held by Anglicans in the Masonic hall on Saturday, November 28th, was decidedly a success. A nice sum was realized financially. The articles on sale were well worth the price asked. The children were delighted with the fish pond and many enjoyed a friendly cup of tea during the afternoon. Mrs. H. Green, of the West Dome, won the pair of embroidered towels offered as a special prize.
