With the recent municipal election contest passed into history, there may be interes; in the elections of the past in Timmins. The 1932 council makes the twenty-first council for the town, the year 1926 having two sets, the first one unseated and the second elected in March, 1926. The following is a resume of the council boards since the ncorporation of the town in 1912:-

The first four years in the history of the town mayor and council were elected by acclamation. Wm. H. Wilson was the first mayor and he was elected to the office for five successive terms by acclamation. J. P. McLaughlin was the town's second mayor. He was elected by acclamation by two successive years, 1917 and 1918. The town's third mayor was Dr. McInnis who held the post for seven successive years, being elected five times by acclamation. He was elected for his eighth term (1926) but the election was protested and in the contest in March, 1926, Dr. ever voted in any munipical election vacant place on the council.

The Election for 1919

Around the close of 1918 there was a decided interest in municipal affairs and a decided interest in municipal and a genera l request for a change. A ratepayers' association was formed and there was a lively contest for both mayoralty and seats on the council. The election took place on Jan. 6th, 1919, and a good vote turned out. Four had been nominated for mayor, but two of them, Messrs Mc-Laughlin and Brazeau withdrew. In the election. 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
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
