Gold Now Leads in Products of Mines

Gold Mines of Canada Now Lead in the Mineral Industry. Output Last Year, \$55,395,000.00

The total value of mineral production in Canada during 1931 was \$227,800,000, compared with \$279,900,000 the previous year, according to the monthly review of business statistics issued on Tuesday of this week by the Department of Trade and Commerce. Gold, which the Dominion is producing in ever increasing quantities, was the bright spot in last year's operations. A total of \$2,679,700 fine ounces worth \$55,395,000 was mined. This value does not include the premium received by gold mining companies due to the present rates of exchange.

"Gold is now Canada's most valuable mineral product," the review says, "even surpassing that of coal which held the premier position for so many years."

Copper production in 1931 totalled 290,880,000 pounds a drop of only five percent from 1930; but owing to decreased prices the value was reduced by 37 percent. The review says:

"It is a great tribute to the management of Canada's copper mines that through the co-operation of the owners operators and miners, they were able to keep in operation under such adverse price and market conditions."

Silver prices in 1931 were the lowest ever recorded. Lead and coal production was lower; but production of crude petroleum increased slightly.

APPRECIATION IN U.S.A. OF THE CANADIAN PREMIER

(Christian Science Monitor)

Premier R. B. Bennett congratulates Canada. He sees the coming Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa as preventing future slumps, finds his tariff measure bringing in industries and turning the trade balance in Canada's favour, and the banking system handling \$1,500,000,000 of the people's savings without loss. But he discovers another asset more valuable still. He sees the Canadian successfully meeting all his obstacles. They are building themselves a superb background. It is really a sort of backstop—against which future hardships may bump and bounce off.

Approximately \$11,000,000 was saved in Canada last year in the cost of construction dwellings and other buildings in 61 cities owing to reduced cost of building materials. Aggregate value in these cities of building permits was \$110,371,410.

The aid of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner in London and of Lord Beaverbrook will be sought by the Maritime Provinces representatives who left aboard S.S. Montcalm from Halifax recently, in an effort to secure the lifting of the British Government's embargo on Canadian potatoes.

A railroad career that has seen many changes and covered much widely separated territory witnessed another movement when Robert E. Larmour, general freight agent, Canadian Pacific Railway, was transferred recently from Montreal to Toronto. Mr. Larmour, aside from his railway duties, is well known as one of Canada's outstanding yachtsmen.

Carnival Queen nominations from Edmonton, Drumheller and Vancouver testify to the great popularity of the Banff annual winter carnival to be held February 6 to 13. The Alberta branch of the A.A.U. of Canada has agreed to hold figure skating championships at the carnival and may hold their ski-ing championships there as well. Every kind of winter sport will be represented.

Entries are coming in rapidly for the great winter event of the 1932 sporting season, the 11th annual Eastern International Dog Sled Derby to be run over a course of 123 miles, spread over the three days February 22-24 and concluding with the Dog Derby Costume Ball at the Chateau Frontenac, February 24. St. Godard, Seppala and other names outstanding in Dog Sled racing are already entered.

The largest shipment of Government-approved cockerels for any one breeder or hatcheryman in Canada arrived recently by Canadian Pacific special at Fergus, Ont., from Winnipeg, of the order of J. G. Tweedle, of the former city. The birds were selected by government inspectors from the choicest flocks from British Columbia to Nova Scotia. During the last four years Mr. Tweedle has shipped an average of 200,000 chickens to various points between the Atlantic and Pacific.

Competition between truck and railroad service is shown in a new angle by a letter recently to a Reading paper, "Labor." A cattle raiser of Niobrara, Nebraska, tried out both methods, shipping cattle by truck and by railroad. On the railroad there was a shrinkage of 21 pounds for each animal; by truck there was a shrinkage of 98 pounds each. What the raiser saved on freight he much more than lost on the animals shipped by truck where the value of the shrinkage amounted to \$12.14 on each animal.

Turning to industrial developments Mr. Lee declared that Moose Factory is the logical site for the world's greatest paper industry in the years to come because of the many rivers which merge there and because of other geographic conditions which make it most admirable for this purpose, as well as for other purposes of commerce.

THE OLDEST BRITISH SOLDIER

(Glasgow Herald) —Troop Sergeant-Major John Stratford, of Wolverhampton, aged 102, the oldest British soldier and the only known survivor of the battle of Ramnuggar, fought in November 22, 1848 and an Indian Mutiny veteran died on Saturday. He enlisted on April 21, 1846 in the 14th Light Dragoons, now the 14th-20th Hussars. He spent 41 years in his country's service. Afterwards he became instructor to Staffordshire Yeomanry, and his last service was with the National Reserve. His five medals were for the Punjab Campaign, 1848-49, Persia 1857, Central India, Indian Mutiny, 1857-58, Long Service and Good Conduct, 1868, and the Meritorious Service Medal, 1900.
