Heavy Fines for the Leaders in Parade

Nick D. Thachuk Fined \$50.00 and Costs. Three Others Fined \$25.00 and Costs, or 21 Days in Jail. Other Police Court Cases

At the police court here on Tuesday there were four men charged with taking part in an unlawful parade in the town of Timmins on Thursday last, contrary to the town by-law in that behalf. When it was learned by the tenor of the bills distributed around town that another parade was planned, the police visited the Finn hall here and informed the leaders there that such a parade would not be permitted as it was contrary to town by-laws as being senseless and useless. When the parade started the police went down and stopped it, arresting the four men who seemed to be the chief leaders. The four were—Nick D. Thachuk, connected with the Workers' Co-operative Store here; Waino Saukko, who gave his address as Goldale townsite; and Eino Ketola and August Pirhainala both the latter giving the Finn hall as their address. In court Thachuk denied taking part in the parade or knowing it was to be held until that afternoon. He would not take the oath on the bible, saying he did not believe in the bible. Police officers told of seeing him in the parade, and he was fined \$50.00 and costs, a total of \$59.00, which he paid. The other three, all aliens, were fined \$25.00 and costs each, a total of \$37.00 each. The alternative to the fine and costs was 21 days each in jail.

A charge of failing to file sales tax returns preferred against a firm in the district was withdrawn. Charges against a Deloro man for alleged theft and the retaining of stolen property were again remanded a week.

For driving with defective brakes a South Porcupine man paid \$20.00 and costs. A charge of non-support against a local man was dismissed, the wife failing to appear in court to press the charge. On a charge of being drunk, a fine of \$50.00 and costs was imposed, it being a second offence, the alternative being a two months term.

Ascid Champagne and Emil Carvel, of Sudbury, were each given 30 days in jail for the thefts of coats from a local hotel. One of these gave Provincial Officer Noyes a black eye while the arrests were being made. Officer Noyes was helping the local police in making the arrests and the two men were begging the officers not to use them roughly as they would go quietly. As Officer Noyes turned his head away after telling the men that the police never are rough in this country, one of the prisoners treacherously struck at the officer, hitting him on the eye. Still the police did not get rough but the prisoners were hustled along.

A Third Avenue restaurant keeper was fined \$5.00 and costs for not keeping his premises up to sanitary standards. Chas. Bigney, a transient, had been unable to get work here and asked that he be sent down as a vagrant until spring comes. He was accommodated with a term of two months at Haileybury.

A boy of about fifteen, who has been in trouble several times before, and who has persisted in truancy from school, was committed to the Industrial School.
