Mining Institute **Meets in Montreal**

Sessions of Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy will be Held at Montreal on April 5th, 6th and 7th.

Why does Canada sell her large surplus of copper principally in the United States, while Great Britain draws her supply mainly from the United States and other foreign countries? Is it feasible so to arrange inter-imperial trade that the surpluses of each of the empire countries can be used to supply the deficiencies of the others? These and other equally pertinent questions are contained in the paper by Dr Charles Camsell, deputy minister of mines, Ottawa, entitled "Mineral Position of the British Empire," which will be the leading feature of the annual meeting of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy in Montreal, April 5, 6 and 7.
