## Timmins Man Given Year for High-Grade

Carmine Arcuri Last Week Sentenced  
Ore. Given Term of One  
by Judge Denton in Case of Gold  
Year.

Last week The Advance made reference to the fact that Carmine Arcuri, of Timmins, where he is well known, having been proprietor of cafes here and known in other capacities, had been found guilty on a charge of high-grading but that sentence had been reserved to another day. When Judge Denton who tried this case at Toronto last week, came to impose sentence on Arcuri, he sentenced the Timmins man to twelve months determinate and six months indeterminate. The chief witness against Arcuri was Paul Spino, who was arrested with Arcuri as the pair stepped off a train from the North here with \$2,400 worth of gold ore in their possession. A similar charge against Spino was withdrawn. "While I could send you to the penitentiary for two years on this charge I will not. But there were so many things that you could not explain during your trial that I am led to believe that you are an old hand at this game." His Honour Judge Denton is quoted as saying.

## WORLD GRAIN EXHIBITION TO BOOST TOURIST TRADE

No Canadian undertaking will give a greater stimulus to the tourist industry of this Dominion than the World's Grain Exhibition and Conference which will take place at Regina in 1933. Large parties are already being organized in many parts of the world for the purpose of attending this great world gathering. Even from far off Australia will come a party of over 100 farmers. Another 200 will come from one state of the American Union, and it must be remembered that the tourist industry has got far beyond a mere theory. "For instance," says a circular published by the Canadian Geographical Society, "Premier the Right Hon. R. B. Bennett has stated that the tourist industry more than any other single factor has been responsible for the relatively good position of Canada in the low economic period through which we have passed. He has urged Canadians to protect the industry, which meant almost \$400,000,000 to us in 1931, by adequate publicity in other countries."

## FRUIT BASKETS NOW BEING MANUFACTURED NEAR HEARST

The Hearst correspondent of the Kapuskasing Northern Tribune last says—"Your correspondent was shown to-day some samples of fruit basket foundations being made by the Dominic Timber Co. of Hearst, now operating near Fire River. We understand the company has already filled some carload orders for this material from basket makers in the southern part of the province, and as there is yearly consumption of over fifty million fruit baskets in the province of Ontario, it is reasonable to expect that the Dominic Co. will get their share of the business, although high transportation charges militate somewhat against the venture, and similar experiments in the North. At present the manufacture of the bottom or foundation of the standard eleven-quart and six-quart baskets only is being attempted, the available material (jack pine) lending itself admirably to the purpose, both in dimension and grain. The veneer material used for the completion of the basket at present must be found elsewhere, but no doubt experiment and research will soon make possible the use of some of our Northern woods for that purpose."

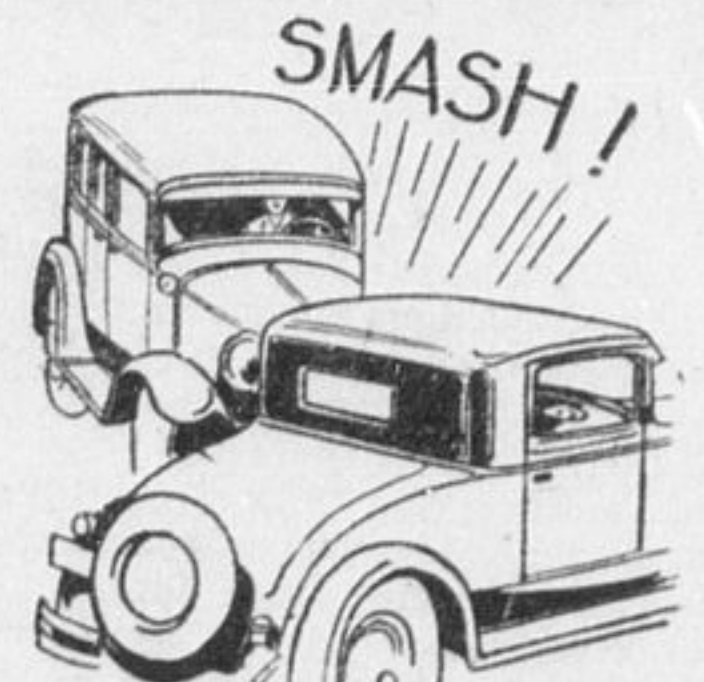
