Re-taking Some of the Timmins Pictures

Metropolitan Films Desirous of Showing Only Perfect Pictures. Town Picture to be Shown in Theatres by April 8th.

In last week's issue The Advance said that the motion pictures of Timmins would be shown at the theatres here this week, and this had been arranged. Some of the pictures, however, did not come up to the standards set by the producers and so were stopped and these films have been re-taken this week.

"They still put rubbers on lead pencils because everybody makes mistakes" the cameraman of Metropolitan Film Productions advised The Advance, while re-taking several scenes that, when passing through the laboratories of the producers, proved defective.

While there have been countless rumours regarding Timmins official debut on the silver screen they are to all appearances without much foundation.

During the photographing of the Timmins scenes a piece of mechanism became defective in one of the cameras which only made itself known when the film was developed and which caused considerable discomfort to the studio officials due to the fact that to maintain the producers' standard of this nature of productions it was necessary to re-take nearly one thousand feet of film.

A cameraman of the producers has been in Timmins during the past few days finishing this work and expects to have it completed so the entire production will go into the theatres not later than April 8th.

A film called "The Golden Romance of Northern Canada," which was produced by the same organization which made the Timmins film, is now running in the Goldfields theatre and goes into the Empire the last of the week. This film deals with the development of northern Canada and is an interesting and educational subject, the theme being woven around Canada's rapid advance in the production of gold during the past few years. Scenes of many of the important mining ventures in the Dominion are incorporated in the review and for a property under development the producers have used that of Pandora, in Cadillac township in Quebec.

In the motion pictures taken of Timmins, it was found that the film showing the Kiwanis Club, the fire and police departments, the Timmins town council and a few other scenes were faulty and these the cameramen have re-taken during their stay here and the scenes have been rushed to the laboratories for development, and as soon as is humanly possible will be returned here for display.

MAY BE AN ELECTION HERE FOR NEW SCHOOL TRUSTEE

On Tuesday nominations were held for the necessary trustee to complete the public school board. At a previous nomination a couple of weeks ago the office had not been filled, making the new nominations necessary.

On Tuesday W. C. Ringsleben was nominated by W. Rinn and G. S. Lowe, and was persuaded to qualify before leaving for New Liskeard on the noon train. Later J. P. Barleiman was nominated by Dr. Minthorn and W. H. Wilson, and he too qualified. This makes an election for the position necessary unless one or other of the candidates nominated withdraws today.

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Death of J. Beatty, of Morrow and Beatty

Was Well Known in the North, Where he had a Number of Large Contracts, Death Due to Carbon Monoxide.

Wide circles of friends and acquaintances in the North Land will deeply regret to learn of the death of James A. Beatty, Toronto engineer and contractor, who was found beneath his car, death being due to carbon monoxide. The late Mr. Beatty, as one of the firm of Morrow and Beatty, had a number of contracts in this North and so his business brought him in touch with many here during the past few years.

A despatch from Toronto this week says:—

"Apparently overcome by carbon monoxide fumes, James A. Beatty, prominent Toronto engineer and contractor, was found dead beneath his automobile on Monday at Toronto. The car was stuck on a mud-clogged road and Mr. Beatty was presumably trying to extricate it when he was overcome. A member of the firm of Morrow and Beatty, of Peterboro, Ont., Mr. Beatty was 53 years of age. He was born and educated at Fergus, Ont. He had been associated with several engineering firms in the United States and with a Montreal consulting engineering firm from 1906 until 1908.

A widely-known power site engineer, Mr. Beatty was associated with many Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission projects of the past decade. The firm of Morrow and Beatty built the Abitibi Canyon power development and is now building the hydro plant at Chats Falls on the Ottawa river.

Mr. Beatty apparently was overcome as he tried to hoist the rear wheels of his car from a slippery rut. He had fallen forward, presumably after breathing fumes from the motor which he had left running. Despite efforts at resuscitation when he was found shortly after his collapse, he failed to revive.

There were five fire calls during the past week, four of them being chimney fires with no damage done. The other call was on Monday at 2:45 p.m. to 205 Pine street south, owned by Walter Crossley. The blaze was caused by a crack in the chimney, it is thought and for a time it looked like a destructive fire. By the good use of the big chemical tank, however, the firemen were able to conquer the fire, with damage being done to the extent of \$75.00. There was no insurance carried.
