Winter Term Examinations High and Vocational School

Results of Examinations in Different Classes at Timmins High and Vocational Schools. "The Results Generally are Fairly Satisfactory," Says Principal Henry. Asks More Attention to Home Work.

In submitting the results of the winter term examinations at the Timmins High and Vocational Schools, Principal Henry makes the following comment:

The students have been given their winter term reports showing the marks obtained at the last term examinations. A number of these reports have been signed by the parents and returned to the school. It is surprising and somewhat disappointing to note the number of reports that are returned without a statement of the length of time taken by the students for home study.

The results generally are fairly satisfactory. There are some students, however, who can and will have to do a great deal better if they intend to make their standing next June.

There are a number of students, the largest percentage being in the Technical forms, who are neglecting to do their homework. I wish to take this opportunity of pointing out to the parents of these students that the student must pass in the academic studies as well as in the practical work and this can be done only by considerable home study.

It is very gratifying, however to see how most of the students in the third and fourth forms of the High School are responding to the opportunity granted by the new regulation. This regulation permits students to obtain complete Junior Matriculation and second class Normal entrance standing by obtaining an average of 66 p.c. in the term work, instead of writing the June Departmental examinations. A student obtaining less than 66 p.c. on the terms' work, may obtain standing by writing the June examinations.

The names of the student by forms, who made honour or pass average standing are listed as follows:

1st class honours, from 75 to 100 p.c. inclusive.

2nd class honours, 66 to 74 p.c. inclusive.

3rd class honours, 60 to 65 p.c. inclusive.

One Killed and Eight Injured at Kirkland Lake

Last week one man was killed and eight others were injured in an accident at the Wright-Hargreaves Mine at Kirkland Lake.

This story of the accident is given as follows by The Northern News, of Kirkland Lake:—

"One man was killed, four were seriously injured and four suffered minor injuries in a distressing mine accident at the Wright-Hargreaves Mine at seven o'clock on Tuesday evening. The nine men were riding on a steel blasting set near the bottom of the number four shaft when the lowering chains broke and allowed the men to fall a distance of thirty-one feet.

"The dead man is Alex R. MacDonald, 37, who received a fractured scapula, broken leg and severe facial bruises. Those seriously injured are: Howie Purdy, fractured right thigh and right collar bone; J. Vour, fractured leg and cuts; T. R. Bullock, two fractured ribs and bruises, and Lauri Laako, fractured shoulder and lacerations on Sydney Laird, lip, cut, nose and leg abrasions; Livingstone Brydges, fractured wrist; H. Wennerholm, forehead bruised, and

E. Stewart, bruises on hip and shoulder.

"The accident occurred as the men were lowering the steel plate to do further timbering in the shaft. One of the four chain blocks lowering the six ton plate is believed to have stuck, the jerk causing the suspending chain to snap. The sudden jar to the set resulted in the other chains breaking and the men falling in a heap at one side of the base of the shaft, thirty feet below.

"The blasting set has dimensions of fourteen feet by fourteen feet, four inches and serves as a platform for the timbermen in their shaft operations as well as protect the timbers when blasting is done at the bottom of the shaft. Each chain block is tested for over three tons. This is the first fatality in shafting operations since the Wright-Hargreaves started.

"The late Mr. MacDonald was born in Judique, Nova Scotia, and has a brother at Sudbury. He was single and resided at the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Ostrom, 62 Second street. The inquest will likely be held on Wednesday evening, March 30."
