HAILEYBURY RELAY RACE THIS YEAR TO BE ON JUNE 4

The annual relay road race promoted by The Haileyburian, will be held at Haileybury this year on June 4th. The date is a week later than last year's event, it being expected that the road will be in better condition and the weather more favourable. Last year Kirkland Lake won the Haileybury road race and have a team to enter this year. There is also a possibility of New Liskeard and Cobalt each having a team entered.

SKAKOON REPORTED AS NOT WORRIED ABOUT HIS FATE

Mike Skakoon, who was sentenced at Cochrane last month to be hanged on June 10th, for the murder of his former common law wife, Mrs. Leake, and who is at present in Haileybury jail, is reported as being little worried as to his fate. He is said to bear up with cool indifference. An appeal has been entered by his counsel asking for a new trial on the grounds that a statement signed by Skakoon while he was in custody in Timmins should not have been used in the trial, at least not in the form in which it was. The appeal has been made to Osgoode Hall, Toronto, but no announcement of the judgment of the higher court has yet been given out. It is not thought, however, that Skakoon has any particular reason to hope for a retrial. Skakoon was arrested on May 20th, 1931 on the charge of murdering his former common law wife, Mrs. Leake, after a quarrel which was believed to have originated through Skakoon not making arrangements to play for the keep of his own wife and family by Mrs. Leake while he was in Rouyn. Mrs. Leake died from a knife wound in the head, also suffering previous injuries from being struck with a flatiron. After his arrest Skakoon volunteered a detailed account of the tragedy to Chief of Police H. Jones. After the death of the woman Skakoon made what appeared to be an effort to commit suicide. He suffered a slight injury to his breast but was not seriously injured.

No More Parades to be Tolerated in Sudbury

Recently Sudbury was somewhat inclined to permit the reds to hold parades to "blow off steam," as it were, but the May Day performances have upset all ideas of any leniency or forbearance for the alien agitators. On May Day the refusal of the red paraders to carry the Union Jack after a practical promise to do so, and their flaunting of the red flag roused the citizens to resentment and there was trouble. Now the attitude taken by the city of Sudbury is that no further "fool parades or other disturbances will be tolerated from the alien reds. They have refused to comply with the laws of the land; they want to make trouble; there will be no more meetings or parades," says Sudbury's chief of police. "The reds laughed at the police commission," said Mayor Fenton, of Sudbury, "and the commission will hold no more meetings with reds or listen to any more of their delegations."

Sherritt-Gordon Closes Until Conditions Improve

Suspension of all operations in its Northern Manitoba property was decided Monday at a meeting of directors of Sherritt-Gordon mines. The measure had been taken, according to an official statement given out following the meeting "because of the disorganized situation in the copper markets of the world" and in an effort not to jeopardize the company's liquid position. Operations would be resumed, the statement said, "as soon as the situation shows definite signs of improvement."

According to present plans, the mine will be shut down for at least 90 days. In his remarks to shareholders at the last Sherritt-Gordon annual meeting, the president, General A. D. McRae, said the company had been successful in cutting its production costs to an average of six cents per pound. Further reductions in cost with only one unit of the concentrator in operation could not be made, it was pointed out, but when the plant's three units were placed in operation it was hoped something further could be done in effecting reductions.

About 700 persons depend on the company for livelihood. General McRae stated. By continuing operations as long as possible, the company had done much to relieve unemployment and by keeping intact its crew of technicians expected to resume production on a full scale as soon as world conditions would warrant such a move. By closing down the northern property, Sherritt-Gordon will retain in its treasury approximately \$750,000 working capital, less \$5,000 a month expenses during the lapse of production.

FORMER PIONEER RESIDENTS OF TIMMINS REVISIT HERE

Mr. and Mrs. Boivin moved up here from their farm at Bonfield, and report the roads as in unusually good condition for this time of year. Mr. and Mrs. Boivin were among the pioneers of Timmins and other parts of the North. Mr. Boivin being for many years in the lumber business in the North. During his residence in Timmins Mr. Boivin took an active part in board of trade activities and in other work for the public. For the past few years he has been out of the lumber business, devoting most of his attention to the farm at Bonfield.

PROGRESS BEING MADE IN FINANCING OF MARCH GOLD

The Northern News last week says: "Satisfactory progress in March Gold financing in the past few weeks has given directors hope that it will not be necessary to stop production in a few weeks as was expected. Money is required to continue the winze below 675 ft. and open up new levels. Funds for this work are beginning to come in and a plan is being considered that would permit of continued production while sinking is in progress. While details have not been announced it is believed that it has to do with a proposal of a deal with the adjoining Ankerite to mill some ore from the extension of March Gold veins in Ankerite. It is expected that it will be possible to soon give a definite announcement. In the meantime production continues about normal, meeting expenditures. Some time ago March Gold directors decided to issue bonds to retire some of the company's outstanding debts, largely to shareholders, but until recently the response was not favourable."
