**Dome Shareholders are Satisfied Now**  
Committee of Shareholders Feel that Their Views as to Paying Earnings to Shareholders are Now Being Met

There has been considerable objection made recently by the shareholders of some of the mining companies in regard to the building up of large surpluses and the using of these surpluses for investment purposes apart from actual mining enterprise. Shareholders in many cases have suggested that they have the right to invest their own money, and the depreciation suffered by some of the securities held by some of the companies has added to the feeling aroused. Dome Mines is by no means the worst example of the building up of surplus to be used for investment. Indeed, the Dome's situation has been a fairly favourable one in this particular. Yet it was a committee of Dome shareholders that led the way in making public protest against the idea of some mining companies in not paying out profits to shareholders as the profits are made. Last week The Advance noted the formation of a committee of Dome shareholders to impress and urge upon the directorate the policy of paying out profits as made to the shareholders. On Friday last, however, this committee of Dome shareholders issued a statement to the effect that the work of the committee had apparently been accomplished, and that affairs generally in this regard might be considered as satisfactory. The statement as issued by the recently organized committee of Dome shareholders read as follows:—"At a conference between Frederick

Burnett, chairman of the recently organized committee of Dome shareholders, the president of the company and some of the board, it developed that, as the more recent action of the board in paying a bonus to shareholders, the views of the committee have, for the 1931 period, in which the net profits, after depreciation and depletion, were \$1.04 per share, been adequately met, and upon the expression by the present Dome management that it would be their view that the annual earnings of the Dome Company, as determined by the final figures of the year, should be paid out as return to the shareholders so far as reasonable conservatism would warrant, it is the opinion of your committee that the work which the committee set out to do has been accomplished."  
"This statement, having been shown to Jules S. Backe, president of Dome, was acquiesced in by him, and he stated that it was his view, and he believed, that the view of the board generally, that the surplus which the Dome Company had accumulated was adequate for any extension of Dome interests which might be possible under present conditions."

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
