



## Dropped Dead at the Successful Card Party on Friday Evening Last Ankerite Property

Elenry Ryley, Well-Known in Timmins Meets Sudden Death from Heart Failure. Funeral with Legion Honours Sunday.

Henry Ryley, a former resident of Timmins and who had only recently returned to the camp, where he was well known, dropped dead at the Ankerite property on Friday last, May 13th Fellow workmen on the mine property spent much time and effort in attempting to revive him but were unable to do so. On the arrival of the doctor it was found that death had been due to heart trouble and that nothing could have been done to bring back life.

The late Henry Ryley was well known and popular in Timmins and district He came first to the camp some five years ago, working for a time for the McIntyre. After being out of work and during which time he left the camp he made his home in Toronto. He returned about three weeks ago and began work at the Ankerite Mine.

The late Henry Ryley was 33 years of age at the time of death. He was born in the Old Country, where his father and mother and sister reside. He has one young sister in Toronto. To these and the other relatives and friends the deepest sympathy of all bere is extended. The late Henry Ryley LADIES' AUXILIARY DANCE had an honourable war service and it was no doubt his efforts in the war that caused his early death. He was a member of the Royal Marine Light Infantry, also a member of Toronto Branch of the Canadian Legion and a life pensioner.

### **Bush Fires Cause of** Damage in District were among the structures destroyed. The few people left homeless were car-

Although Early in the Year for Bush Fires, Rouyn, Noranda, Kirkland Lake and Other Centres Threatened by Fires.

This is recognized as early in the year for bush fires but the woods are dry and several sections of the district have been visited this week by the danger of bush fires, while some other communities have actually suffered loss. A despatch on Tuesday from Kirkland Lake said that in the vicinity of Kirkland Lake two bush fires were burning on Monday one from the south and the other from the southwest. One of them threatened the Teck Hughes mine buildings. More than 1.000 men were engaged in fighting the flames. Heavy rain about 3 o'clock saved the situation. So menacing was the danger at one time that trains were held at Kirkland and Boston Creek so that residents might evacuate the towns necessary. Word received by The Advance on Tuesday from Kirklanc Lake stated that the menace was not nearly so great as suggested by the sentence preceding, in which there was indicated thought of evacuating the town. Another despatch from Kirkland Lake said that during Monday there was much danger from bush fires in the Kirkland Lake area. 
