Hollinger Won the Football Opening

First Game of the Season Goes to Hollinger Team. A nice Brand of Football, Timmins to Have Only One Team This Season.

The N. O. F. A. opened up their league schedule on Saturday last with a fixture between the Dome and Hollinger at the Timmins athletic grounds. This year instead of running the five or six teams in Timmins it was decided to run one and do away with the P. D. F. L. making it more interesting football.

On Saturday the Hollinger came out the winners by 2 goals to 1.

Dome:—Rowe goal; F. Blair and Foster, backs; Munro, Crawford and J. Whyte, half backs; Rudkin, Cook, W. Whyte, T. Blair and Jones, forwards, Doran, sub.

Hollinger:—Gaw, goal; McWhinney and Goodman, backs; Robson, Boyd and McConnell, half backs; Landers, Roy, Johnston, Lloyd and Carroll, forwards.

A. Cadman, referee.
Hollinger won the toss but as the wind blew across the field there was little choice.

The Dome took the offensive at the kick-off and tested the Hollinger backs. Goodman intercepted two good centres by Jones, and cleared, Carroll at the other end centred twice and Blair relieved by conceding a corner, which was fruitless. Hollinger had a narrow escape when Goodman conceded a corner and a well-placed shot by Rudkin was just twisting under the bar as Gaw fisted it out. Jones tried to head it back but went wide. Jones took a pass and got right in but failed to score, by poor shooting. Gaw was showing his fine ability as a goalkeeper at this time, by saving two good shots. One was only ten feet from him. T. Blair came right in and sent a ground twister in and Gaw saved by fisting the leather across the goalmouth for a corner. At the other end Rowe had to save two good shots from Landers and Roy. Cook and Whyte came down and were right on the goal-lines and again Gaw made a wonderful save.

Holly made another good attempt to score and Johnston was badly hurt about the face while trying to rush the ball past Rowe.
Another dangerous play came when Rudkin sent over a fine shot and hit the upright and Whyte headed the rebound over the bar.

The Hollinger took up the offensive during the dying moments of the first half and Rowe was called on to make three saves in quick succession and before he was relieved Landers and Roy drove two more at him.

Just before the whistle Gaw saved a low drive from Whyte and Cook finished the play by skying the ball over.
The second half started with Doran subbing for Jones who had missed plenty of chances during the first half. It certainly strengthened the team.

The Dome pressed and got two corners, which were fruitless. Blair gave a nice pass to Whyte who hit the cross-bar. Whyte dribbled the ball back again and Goodman in clearing sent the leather back to Whyte who drove a low one past Gaw for the first score.

The Dome were spurred on by this point and again Whyte broke through and with only Gaw to beat his kick was weak and wide.

The Hollinger seemed as if they could not get going. McWhinney and Goodman along with Gaw deserve a whole lot of credit in their heading plays in keeping the Dome from scoring. The last fifteen minutes of play was thrilling, for the Hollinger found out it was better to pass the ball to their own players instead of the Dome like they had been doing. Carroll got a pass and Rowe had to run out to save and this started the old ball rolling for the Hollinger but before it could get under control, Whyte fell on it and held it. This started an argument between Crawford and Roy which nearly ended in a fight. After the penalty was kicked some talking back was done to referee Cadman by Crawford and Cadman took the right course in ordering Crawford off the field. The penalty was taken by Johnston was hit the cross-bar. Just before final whistle the Hollinger were playing rings around the Dome and from some lively passing Lloyd finally found the net for the winning goal for the Hollinger, but took a painful injury in doing so.

Some special mention should be made to "Handsome Pat", the neutral linesman for the Hollinger, for he gave referee Cadman fine assistance and it would be a good example if all linesmen would carry out this plan, for it would make better football.
