Two Auto Accidents Near Kapuskasing

Little Boy Killed when Hit by Car at Opazatika, West of Kapuskasing. Dust Causes Another Accident.

Those using the roads of the district last week will not need to be told of the serious danger caused by clouds of dust at various parts of the roads. The dry weather and the use of gravel containing sand or dry clay made occasional clouds of dust that made trave more or less dangerous. It will not be surprising to motorists to learn that there was one accident due to flying dust. Indeed, the wonder is likely to be that there were not more. There was one accident reported from Kapuskasing last week where dust was the prime cause. There was also a fatal accident in which a child lost its life. the baby being thrown over 54 feet after being hit.

Details of the two automobile accidents on the Cochrane to Hearst extension of the Ferguson highway, one of them a fatality with a three year old child as the victim, and the other the result of dust raised by passing traffic, are given in reports to district headquarters of the provincial police at Haileybury from Constable W. R. Bryne, at Kapuskasing. Roy later was arrested on instructions from Magistrate Tucker and released on \$2,000 cash bail. According to the officer's report, the Roy car was the road, and the child's body was carried 54 feet six inches. Roy is said to have swerved his car in an effort to avoid striking the boy, but caught him while traveling on the driver's left hand side of the road. Opazatika is a few miles west of Kapuskasing.

In the other accident, which happened a few hours before. Walker and Cyrenne were in a car driven by the former, while the grader, in a hollow of the road, was travelling slowly west in Fauquier township, east of Kapuskasing. Another automobile had passed the grader and had met Walker on the top of a hill, but the dust from this car and from the grader below blinded Walker's vision, the report states, and his car piled into the government road machine. Thousand Families to be Placed on Land

Settlement to be Chiefly in the North Land. Committee to be Set up to Select Applicants for Farms.

One thousand families, mostly the Northern part of the province will be taken care of by a "back-to-theland" plan this coming winter, according to announcements made at Toronto last week. The cost of the plan is to be borne three ways, one-third from the province, one-third from the Dominion Government and one-third from the municipalities. Announcement was made of the plan

last week by Premier Henry after series of conferences with Hon. Wm Finlayson, who investigated the possibilities of the scheme. > To return to the announcement made last week by Premier Henry, it may be said that the statement as issued by the prime minister is as follows:-Result of Negotiations.

"For some time negotiations have been taking place between the Domin ion and the Provincial Governments in reference to a land settlement scheme. Large sums of money have Dominion Government and the Provincial Government individually during the past two years, and both governments have very generously assisted municipalities in municipal undertakings. All this was intended to relieve unemployment by providing work. This effort has been fairly successful, and, if the depression had only lasted for one or two years, it might have been sufficient, but unfortunately there is every evidence that the period of depression will continue until at least next winter, and neither the Governments nor the municipalities have the means to carry on work on the same scale. The Provincial Conference recently held at Ottawa unanimously came to the conclusion that it would be absolutely necessary to take care of the distress from unemployment by direct relief. It was felt, however, that something might be done by way of giving experienced farmers an opportunity to return to the land with a moderate amount of help.

land wherever available. The Dominion has appropriated a considerable sum for the purpose, and the province is appropriating a similar amount. If the municipalities contribute an equal amount, there will be available about enough to take care of one-thousand families in the province of Ontario.

"The amount to be advanced cannot be used for the purchase or rental of land, but it is hoped that it will make a sufficient amount available to start some experienced people on the land.

"The personal selection of families for this scheme is regarded as being most essential. Experience in land settlement schemes has shown that only those with farming experience and suitable physique are likely to succeed. For this reason the agreement provides that a selection committee must be set up whose duty will be to consider applications from municipalities and to decide whether persons recommended by the municipalities are suitable and the amount of the grant that will be available for the purpose.

"It will be seen that the first step must be made by intending settlers applying to their municipalities, and if the municipalities are willing to help to a limited amount, an equal amount and the province if the parties are considered as proper material."
