A despatch from Devonshire, between Forquij Junction and Cochrane, last week says that twelve hundred cords of the huge stocks of pulpwood on the railway siding at that place were destroyed by fire early on Friday morning. The fire is believed to have been of incendiary origin, according to the despatches, and the police are seeking clues as to the person or persons thus causing serious loss to the owners of the pulpwood. The destroyed wood was the property of three large dealers in pulpwood—The Thompson Hyland Pulp Co., Toronto, D. Chenier, Cochrane and I. Silver, Timmins. The despatches also say that more one thousand cords were saved through the efforts of a crew which manned a tank car sent from Cochrane to fight the fire. This crew did notable work. The fire in the pulpwood gave a basis to stories that eventually went to suggest that bush fires were responsible for the pulpwood destruction. According to the despatches this was not the case.
