SCHOOL TAXES IN LORRAIN HAVE BEEN MUCH REDUCED

A despatch last week from Cobalt says:—"Settlers and other property owners in School Section No. 1, Lorrain township, south of North Cobalt on the Silver Centre road, will have a substantial reduction in their rates this year as a result of the action of their assessor, C. Bigelow, in placing a valuation on a power line owned by the Canada Northern Power Corporation, but not nearly as much as if the original idea of that official of the section had gone through as he proposed.

"But he was inexperienced in his work," according to W. C. Inch local barrister, who appeared at the Court of Revision on behalf of the trustees, and finally his figure of \$250,000 was cut to \$25,000, an assessment suggested by J. A. Legris, also a lawyer from Haileybury, who represented the company, which had appeal the assessment. The effect of the compromise is to practically double the assessment of the section, which before had been but \$25,400, according to figures given at the meeting of the Court of Revision on Saturday.

"The power company has a high tension line running across the section into Quebec from its plant at the Upper Notch, on the Montreal river, and it was being assessed this year for the first time, it was stated. On the ground that other properties in the section were assessed too low, the corporation had appealed them, but this action did not proceed after the matter of the power line had been ironed out satisfactorily. B. V. Harrison, general manager of the Canada Northern Power Corporation, with other officials attended the court sittings in the No. 2 school house. Some further adjustments were made at the court on other appeals lodged."

Elegant New Restaurant Opened in Town This Week

TWO YEARS FOR WRITING THREATENING LETTERS

Pleading guilty on Tuesday before Magistrate J. S. McKessock, at Sudbury, Euphemi Klemba, aged 33 years, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary, with the recommendation that he be deported at the expiration of his term. Klemba was accused of writing intimidating letters for the purpose of extorting money. On April 18th, J. A. Laberge, prominent lumber dealer at Sudbury, received a letter threatening to shoot him unless he left \$1,235.00 near the aviation camp. Instead of complying with the demand, Mr. Laberge adopted the same attitude as that taken by John Dalton here under somewhat similar conditions. He informed the police of the threat and went on a still hunt to get the writer of the letter. On April 23rd and April 30th Aaron Silverman received letters written in Polish ordering him to put \$1,325.00 in a tree on the Jewish picnic ground at Sudbury, and again on June 8th Mr. Silverman got another letter demanding that he pay \$1,500.00 or he would be shot. Mr. Silverman also turned the matter over to the police. Investigation by the provincial police pointed to Klemba and on June 13th he was arrested. In a signed statement to the police Klemba admitted writing the letters but claimed that the reason he did so was to get deported. He will likely get his wish in this respect in 1934. On a second charge of being in possession of a revolver without a permit and while being an alien, Klemba was also fined \$20.00 and costs, or one month.
