McLean; centre, H. McLean; rover, Murphy; home, Lowry, Pollard; spares, Parsons, Cook, Montgomery, Michaelson, Proulx. The game was just nicely under way when Murphy flashed through with a first tally for the Dome. It soon became evident it was a much stronger aggregation Dome were up against that the team that had been out from Timmins the week previously. In the remaining periods the strenuous work began to tell on the newly-formed Timmins team as they tired and Dome ran away from them shooting in four goals in quick succession. In the fourth Masecar shot, Morris saved then Murphy came in quick on the rebound to make sure. Lowry to Pollard netted the next.
