

**Care Needed by Drivers  
Parents and Children**

(Stratford Beacon-Herald)  
"I might have killed a child, and if I had I know it would not have been within my power to prevent it." That was the impression A. A. McQueen of St. Mary's carried with him after an experience on the way from his town to Toronto just after he had entered Stratford. On Erie street a small lad ran out from the road directly in front of his car. By immediate application of brakes which, fortunately, were good, and quick swerving of the car's direction, the accident was prevented.  
We often read about such cases, but not often is it possible to secure the impression of the driver of the car. Very likely had the child been struck and injured Mr. McQueen would have been numbered with careless drivers. We met Mr. McQueen just a few moments after and he was nervous. In brief his view was: "It happened so quickly. A moment before there was no one on the road. There were some children on the right-hand side and I watched them fearing that one might run out. Then when I was not 20 feet away this little fellow dashed from the other side. There he was right in front of me and when he saw the car he did not know which way to go; neither did I. The only thing that saved the child were the foot brakes and emergency brakes that were good. I can quite well imagine that some drivers of a nervous sort might have hesitated for a moment, and that moment would

have been fatal. Children themselves perhaps do not realize danger, but I wish parents would keep on telling them of the danger there is on the road."  
Drivers and children and parents would do well if they could realize that such incidents, highly hazardous as they are, occupy only a few seconds, accident or escape are registered almost immediately. Fortunately Mr. McQueen's action was quick and his judgment was correct. Even of greater importance is this: His brakes worked. When a driver faces such a situation it is too late to have brakes adjusted or re-lined. He has to use the equipment he has, and if it is not of the best then he has to face the consequences. There are two factors of equal importance in the experience of Mr. McQueen:  
1—Parents cannot too often warn their children of the danger of the road.  
2—Drivers cannot be too particular regarding the condition of their brakes. Mr. McQueen was able to go on his way to Toronto after such an experience because he had at his command in a crisis good service and emergency brakes. Otherwise the outcome might have been entirely different.

**MANY PUPILS WRITING HERE  
ON DEPT. EXAMINATIONS**

The schools here are closing for the summer vacation, the chief activity now being the writing on departmental examinations. At the high school the entrance examinations were in progress this week with about 180 pupils writing on these tests. There were 70 entrance candidates from the Central school, 40 from the Mattagami school, 35 from the Holy Family school and around another 35 from St. Anthony's school.  
The various other departmental examinations are also in progress here this week.  
The promotion results for the public and separate schools are also being issued. The results at most of these schools will be published next week in The Advance. It will be some weeks before the results of the entrance and other departmental examinations will be known.

**INVESTIGATION INTO THE  
CHARGES MADE AT RENFREW**

The investigation being conducted by a representative of the Attorney-General's office into charges made against Chief M. Greer and the police magistrate at Renfrew by Councillor J. Fennessey, chairman of the town police committee, has been in progress for a week or more. Although over 75 witnesses have been examined it looks as if it would take some days more to conclude the case. The evidence given so far has been along the line that certain people have paid stated amounts to the chief or magistrate for fines and costs, while the returns to the crown have indicated lesser amounts, usually two to ten dollars less. Neither the chief nor the magistrate's side of the case have been given yet. There is an array of counsel for the different parties concerned. The chief line of defence, until the chief and magistrate give their own evidence, is along the line that the whole matter has been due to ill-will and that witnesses have been induced to give evidence with the idea of discrediting the authorities. One witness told about being offered money to give evidence or secure evidence, but refusing. The reports from the session on Tuesday indicate that the past record of Councillor Fennessey was being brought forward. On the stand he admitted having served time for a serious offence and also being in court on another charge that of pointing a revolver at a policeman. "It was his own revolver," he said on the stand. The conviction against Fennessey was in 1906.  
His friends in the town and district will regret to know that Bruno Carnovale was taken ill a week or so ago and had to be removed to St. Mary's hospital. He is now reported as making good progress to recovery.
