Death of a Pioneer North Bay Resident

Mrs. Reynolds, Mother of Mrs. H. R. Channen, of Timmins, Passed Away on Friday Last, at the Age of 62 Years.

Wide circles of friends in Timmins and district will extend sympathy to Mrs. H. R. Channen, of town, and to Harry J. Reynolds, formerly of Timmins, and now practising law at North Bay, in the death of their mother, Mrs. Reynolds, North Bay. In referring to the death and funeral The North Bay Nugget this week says:—

"North Bay's pioneer ranks lost another prominent member this week-end in the person of Helen Maud Reynolds, widow of Thomas Reynolds, whose sudden death occurred on Friday evening at her French River summer home. Friends at the house were preparing to play bridge, but Mrs. Reynolds, complaining of fatigue, went to rest and died from a heart seizure a few minutes later. Born in Port Huron, Mich., 62 years ago, Mrs. Reynolds was formerly Miss Helen Maud Bradbeer, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Bradbeer. She attended the local education institutions and spent most of her early life in that city. In 1890 she was married to Thomas Reynolds, C.P.R. conductor, in Ottawa, and the couple then came to North Bay to make their home at 236 McIntyre street west, the house built by Mr. Reynolds and where his widow lived until the time of her death. All of the Reynolds children were born in this old homestead, married from there, and this afternoon marked the second funeral to leave its doors, the first being that of Mr. Reynolds who died on March 6, 1928. Mrs. Reynolds had been an active member of St. John's Anglican Church, giving of her time willingly and cheerfully. She taught Sunday school for many years and was a valued member of the Ladies' Auxiliary and even though failing health prevented her from continuing her work during later years she had always maintained a keen interest in church and community affairs. She was a well-known and highly esteemed citizen and her passing came as a shock, not only to relatives and immediate friends, but to a wide circle of acquaintances throughout the community. The chief mourners are three daughters, Mrs. H. R. Channen, Timmins; Mrs. H. Tiffney, Philadelphia; and Mrs. George Duncan, North Bay; and one son H. J. Reynolds, North Bay, barrister, one brother, Millian Bradbeer, Detroit, Mich.; and two sisters, Mrs. Stuber, Port Huron, Mich.; and Mrs. Sales, Seattle, Wash. A host of persons paid final tribute to the memory of the deceased pioneer resident at the funeral held in St. John's cemetery. The pallbearers were John Blanchet, Dr. R. J. Dudley, George Leach, H. Tweitford, Frank Reynolds and H. A. Heavener. Numerous beautiful floral offerings were received. Among those from out-of-town who attended the funeral were R. S. Reynolds, Chatham; J. Reynolds, Smiths Falls; and W. Creighton, Ottawa."

Good Wrestling at Rink Here on Friday

Some Swift Action in Wrestling Card Here Last Week. Chief Jones Warns the Battlers Against Undue Excitement.

On Friday evening last, the fans of Timmins were treated to a good wrestling card, in the skating rink. Wet weather, along with a good, well-arranged card, brought out a good crowd, that left satisfied.

Promptly at 8:30 the announcer stepped through the ropes and announced Dr. Fred Myers, the Chicago dentist, and gave his weight as 198 pounds. In the other corner he announced Leo Numa, of Vancouver, and gave his weight as 198 pounds. The referee was Al. Pitcher, of Hamilton, former light-heavyweight boxing champion of Canada.

Early in the bout Numa attempted a strangle-hold with his arms, but Meyers wriggled out of it. Then there started a real wrestling match, both fighters appearing to lose their tempers. At one time Numa started a series of elbow punches that hurt Meyers a lot, and during this avalanche of elbows that found a target on the side of Myers' face, Chief Jones, of the Timmins police, stepped into the ring and warned the fighters that if it was not stopped he would stop the fight. This cooled them down for a while then Numa got rough again. Five times after that Myers had to grab the ropes and pull himself out of the ring. After 45 minutes of wear and tear on the human structure that the ordinary person could never stand, the fight was called a draw. When it finished both wrestlers were standing up and grappling around, trying to get a hold.

After this fight the announcer introduced H. Nikannen, a local man, who challenged any heavyweight. No response was made so he announced Gus Sonnenberg, of Dartmouth, former world's heavyweight champion, weighing 205 pounds. His opponent was Pat Reilly, of Ireland, weighing 200 pounds. Sonnenberg looked much smaller because he was so short but he was very heavily-built. Most of the wrestling in this match was done on the mat. After fifteen minutes or throwing each other around, Sonnenberg took a flying tackle and made short work of pinning Reilly's shoulders to the mat for the first fall.

The fighters then had a 10-minute rest before starting the second round. In this period the crowd had time to talk things over and from indications of what was being said, they were well-satisfied that Sonnenberg was a finished wrestler.

The fighters came out for the second round as fresh as ever and squirmed and twisted around for almost nine minutes, when Sonnenberg got the second fall with a flying mare that almost knocked Reilly unconscious. Sonnenberg was then declared the winner, as it was a "two-falls out of three" affair. The wrestling was through early, about ten o'clock, and the crowd was well satisfied.
