Open Season This Year for Partridge Hunting

According to announcement made at Toronto last week-end there will be an open season this year for partridge. The announcement was made by Hon. Geo. Chalmers, Minister of Game and Fisheries, who had just returned to the city after a trip to several parts of the province. It is said that during his tour of the province he secured as nearly as possible the popular opinion in regard to partridge shooting and found the general opinion was strongly in favour of an open season this year. Last year there was strong demand for an open season for partridge, the birds having increased to such a noticeable extent that it seemed reasonable to allow at least a short open season. Although it was actually announced, but without any authority, that the open season would be allowed, the department definitely decided against this and gave the birds a further year's protection. Partridge are unusually plentiful now. Men motoring to and from the South have not only noted these birds on the roads but in some cases have been unable to avoid running over them, so bold are they from their long protection. It is now eight years since there was an open season for partridge. The open season this year will not be a long one, it is understood, and there will be a limit on the bag allowed.

Committed for Trial on Serious Charge Friday

Clarence Pearce, Cobalt, was committed for trial in a higher court when he was charged before Magistrate Atkinson at Halleybury on Friday afternoon with having abducted a 15-year-old girl of that town, and who described herself in her evidence as "his particular friend." The girl told the court that, with another girl and four other men, she had gone to Swastika with the accused on August 17, following a series of three parties, which began at 4 p.m. the previous day and continued until nine in the morning of the 17th. Before leaving Cobalt, there had been improper relations between Pearce and the girl, the latter said, although she admitted having been similarly involved with "many other men" previously in an answer she gave W. C. Inch, defence counsel.

At Swastika, they had stayed at the home of a relative of Gil Blais, member of the party.

The defendant subsequently was released on \$2,000 bail to appear for trial later. On Saturday morning, at Cobalt a second charge which had been preferred against him was heard, the mag-

istrate in this instance reserving for a week his decision. This count alleged Pearce supplied liquor to a minor. The girl swore that accused had given her a glass of wine at Kirkland Lake, and her father again gave evidence regarding her age. This was the only evidence taken. W. C. Inch announcing there was no defence.

When the bench stated the Crown must show accused knew the girl was a minor, Crown Attorney F. L. Smiley, K.C., said the fact was self-evident. In the interval, the magistrate will look up cases on the point.
