

T. F. D. Girls Lose to North Bay Team

Vitality Girls' Softball Team Wins Here Saturday, 18 to 5, in Second Game for Ferguson Cup. Local Girls do Well for First Season.

North Bay Vitality girls' softball team playing almost errorless ball and swatting at all offerings won them the right to enter the finals for the Ferguson cup.

On Saturday at the athletic field the Vitality girls in their second encounter of home and home games, the first being played at North Bay in which the Vitality won by the narrow margin of 15 to 14. On Saturday a different tale was told when they won out by a score of 18-5. For this Miss Weiss deserves a whole lot of credit for her superior pitching, being credited with 12 strikeouts, and putting out three others. The infield gave her good backing.

McIntyre Won First Game in the Finals

Defeated Temiskaming, Quebec, by Score of 2 to 1 Saturday in Game for E.O.B.A. Championship and Ottawa Journal Trophy.

After winning out last week best two out of three games with the Davidsons, city league champions of Ottawa, the McIntyre baseball team played the team from Temiskaming, Quebec, on Saturday in the finals for the E.O.B.A. championship and the Ottawa Journal trophy. In this first match of the finals McIntyres and Temiskaming played at Carleton Place, Ont., the McIntyres winning by a 2 to 1 score. It was notable baseball with the teams remarkably well matched and both teams playing a steady and very careful game. In the ninth innings it was a tie, one all, and then with two men down, Eddie Angrignon ripped a hot single through second base, scoring Harold Buck and winning the game.

Gar Jelly, pitcher for Temiskaming team, played a great game and in the ninth it looked as if an extra innings might be necessary to decide the issue, but the rally by McIntyre settled the matter.

As in the other games in which the McIntyre figured in the E. O. B. A. series, The Ottawa Journal gave a very full and detailed account of Saturday's match. The Journal comments that there were few exciting or spectacular moments in the game until the ninth innings. The crowd was looking for an extra innings, "but," says The Journal report, "they reckoned without the fighting qualities of Harold Buck who shared the hero's role with Angrignon by starting the rally that broke up his own pitching duel with Jelly and ended the game. The little McIntyre southpaw smashed a hard hit single to second base that Souliere failed to hold and Tommy Boyd followed up with another to right field that sent Buck to third. Then came Angrignon, setting himself firmly he waited for one that he liked and promptly connected. The ball took one hop over the pitcher's box and then bounced by the veteran "Bull" McGrath at second and continued to the outfield while Buck streaked for home with the winning tally."

The Journal gives credit to Jelly for good pitching, though saying that his delivery was not as steady as that of his rival, Buck was tight with base hits, the report says, issuing only seven of them. Previous to the opening

of the game, according to The Journal, I. A. Solmon, manager of the McIntyres, protested the eligibility of Jelly, claiming he did not qualify under the residence rule. The protest was not sustained by President William Pollock of the Eastern Ontario Baseball Association, who was on hand for the game. According to The Journal, "McIntyres exhibited the same abilities to capitalize on opportunities which they did against Davidsons, and when Temiskaming presented them with their chance by committing two costly errors, the McIntyres stepped right in and gathered one run to take the lead. Smart fielding by McIntyre dismissed the opposition in the opening half of the ninth and afforded the winners a chance to follow with their winning assault. In addition to pitching a fine game, Harold Buck helped out at bat with a pair of hits. Angrignon with same number was another star while Boyd, Cybouski and Cowden all fielded well."
