Jelly in Excellent Form

Jelly, their sturdy pitcher, turned in a good game that was good enough to win against an ordinary team, and had he been accorded the support that Wood received, the score would have been decidedly closer.

Errors Aid Opponents.

Jelly allowed eight hits and only in the third were they bunched when McIntyre scored three runs on three hits. Errors behind him led largely to his undoing and the inability of his mates to touch the deceptive slants of Wood kept his team running behind from the start.

A crowd of 3,000 composed of keen Carleton Place spectators and from Smiths Falls, Almonte, Perth and the surrounding area jammed the grandstand and flowed over the sidelines. They were treated to a game that offered in the main sound, steady baseball but that was devoid of a plethora of outstanding features.

Wood gave as masterly an exhibition of hurling as has yet been seen in a Journal Trophy final. He allowed a bare three hits, all of them singles and kept them scattered over three innings. He fanned eight men against seven by Jelly.

Pile Total Up Steadily

The McIntyre pitcher, however, was given every help from his fellow players. They refused to make an error all afternoon and Wood was at no time in danger. They hit behind him when his meant runs, piling up steadily the total that eventually crowded Temiskaming, Quebec, from the baseball picture.

Buck made a brilliant catch in left field when he raced to the fence to spear Bernard's long soaring fly and Souliere the Temiskaming, Quebec, shortstop drew the plaudits of the crowd in the seventh when he nailed Buck's smashing drive in deep short and doubled Wood off second.

Cybouski and Cowden were the only hitters to smash their way for extra bases, Cybouski connecting in the third scoring Boyd and Cowden a minute later followed him with another double that brought Angrignon and Cybouski home but he was out trying to stretch it into a triple.

McIntyre lost no time jumping out in front. In the first innings Buck beat out a bunt to first and went to second when Doran dropped a pitched ball and scored on Souliere's error of Boyd's grounder. Boyd advanced to second on a high throw to the plate and he took third on Angrignon's sacrifice. He sprinted to the pan when he beat out Pappin's heave to the plate of Cybouski's roller.

Some Quick Scoring

After Buck had been called out on a dubious third strike in the third, Boyd got a life on McGrath's error. Angrignon grounded to Jelly, who

hurled the ball to second to cut off Boyd but Souliere failed to hold the pitch and both were safe. Cybouski doubled to left scoring Boyd and sending Angrignon to third. Cowden up behind Cybouski added another double bringing in Angrignon and Cybouski, but was out attempting to make an additional base on his hit.

In the fifth, the sensational Buck singled and blazing his way on the paths for two bases on Boyd's sacrifice bunt anchored on third from where he scored on Angrignon's huge wallop to Costello in centre.

The scoring was suspended until the ninth.

Jelly kept bearing down and was in a hole on only one occasion in the seventh when Souliere's smart double play extricated him. Wood pitching in that same sure form that characterized him from start to finish and through the entire playdown series had the Temiskaming, Quebec, batters eating out of his hand and they were unable to hit beyond the infield with the exception of the three hits racked against him until the ninth when Noffke lifted a high one to Gilbert in right field.

The scoring for the day ended when Cowden, the McIntyre shortstop singled cleanly over third in the ninth. He went to second on a passed ball and then took third on Doran's error who hit him endeavouring to catch him off second. The ball bounded into right centre and he trotted in from third on Wood's single to left.

Temiskaming, Quebec, went out in one, two, three order in their final half of the ninth, Noffke flying to Gilbert and McGrath and Rothwell striking out.

The victors richly deserved their triumph. They showed themselves to be all over a better team than the Quebec aggregation and compare more than favourably with previous champions of the Eastern Ontario Association.

Open Season for Shooting Partridge Oct. 10 to 26

As noted in The Advance last week, when full details of the announcement were given, the open season for partridge in this part of the North will be from Oct. 10th to 26th. In the area north of the Canadian National Railways line the open season is from Oct. 10th to Nov. 5th.

In making the announcement Hon. G. H. Challies, Minister of Game and Fisheries, made an appeal to sportsmen for rigid observance of the regulations in the general interests. This appeal evidently failed with some in this district who are said to have been out in the past week or two shooting the birds, though the season does not open until Oct. 10th. With the appeal to good sportsmanship having failed it looks as if there should be an appeal to the law.

Bag limits of 5 per day and 15 per season were specified for the open season, but rumours credit one of the men shooting out of season with bagging eight in one day.

It would be well to remember for the section lying north of the French and Mattawa rivers and Lake Nipissing and south of the main line of the C.N.R., the open season is from Oct. 10th to 26th, both days inclusive, and anyone shooting partridge at any other time is not only breaking the law, but doing something very decidedly unsportsmanlike.
