135 SETTLERS PLACED NOW UNDER THE RELIEF SCHEME

At the present time 135 settlers have been placed in Northern Ontario under the relief land settlement scheme, according to an official of the Department of Lands and Forests. Wet and unpleasant weather has greeted recent arrivals, but, despite this, the settlers seem happy to get a chance to start building for themselves. Distribution has been made as follows: New Liskeard, 15 new settlers; Englehart, 115; Matheson, 45; Cochrane and Fauquier, 20; Kapuskasing, 20, and Hearst, 10.

Big Showing at the Ronocco Property

Work at Claims in the Night Hawk Lake Area Giving Very Promising Results. Property Looks Unusually Good.
Interesting and very promising reports come from the Night Hawk Lake area in regard to the Ronocco Gold Mines property. Work has been carried on for some time and the results indicate a property of unusual promise. Work this summer has uncovered a fractured zone 32 feet wide in two places 200 feet apart. At ten feet from surface, cut across 10 ft. in each case, assays from \$4.80 to \$22.00 have been obtained. The vein has been traced for 700 feet and the surface showings would indicate a property of unusual promise. The showings are on claims next to the Gold Island and Night Hawk Peninsula properties.
Arrangements have now been made for diamond drilling. One of the big brokerage houses has arranged for the purchase of 500,000 shares of the Ronocco stock, 250,000 now and another 250,000 later on. This will take care of the financing and provide for the diamond drilling and other exploratory and development work to prove the property a mine.
At the Red Dog claims in the Night Hawk Lake area there has also been considerable work done. Samples taken by A. G. Burrows, provincial geologist, gave assays of \$4.80 and \$14.40.
There is general belief that noteworthy progress will be made by the Night Hawk Lake area in the near future and that the confidence of old-timers who have such faith in this section will be upheld. The work done this summer indicates remarkable chances for the area.
Sudbury Star.—Construction of the Ferguson highway from North Bay into the Temiskaming country has undoubtedly been worth while. According to official figures 29,052 cars have sped north through the Temagami forest reserve this year, and they have carried 89,408 people.

Showed Disapproval of Unsportsmanlike Action

The rope was fastened and preliminaries looked after for the needed tow. In the meantime there was friendly conversation between the parties concerned.
The gentleman eventually noted guns in the car.
"What are you doing with the guns?" he asked.
"Oh, just shooting partridge" was the reply.
"Don't you know that the open season for partridge hasn't opened yet?" was the next question.
The couple laughed. "Yes," they answered, "but who cares?"
The gentleman deliberately unhitched the rope. "It is unsportsmanlike, as well as a breach of the law to slaughter the birds now," he said.
"You can stay here till doomsday," he continued, as he started up his car.
He laughed as the car resumed its homeward way, leaving the stranded couple to their own devices. "Yes," he said, "but who cares?"

Excellent Boxing Draws Large Crowd

Boxing Card Presented by Henry Bussineau Pleases Crowd of 900 or More on Wednesday Night This Week.
About 900 people left the skating rink last night well satisfied with the excellent boxing programme presented under the direction of Henry Bussineau and P. O'Gorman. It was one of the very best boxing cards ever put on in Timmins, and well deserved the good support it received.

The bouts were ably refereed by a man who knows how and who is very well known in boxing circles—Arthur Leonard. He handled the bouts effectively and showed very good judgment when he gave Bussineau a technical knockout in the final bout.

The timekeeper was P. A. Macaulay, a well-known sportsman, and the judges were Joe Thomas, of South Porcupine, and Len (Frenchy) Morris, of Timmins.

W. J. McCoy and J. Martell each got a box of cigars as the winners of the lucky numbers in the drawing for the lucky programmes.

The first bout, between the Delorme brothers, drew many a laugh and cheer. These young lads fought four 1-minute rounds and it was good stuff. Ernie the younger lad got the decision. He was formerly the Kiwanis boxing champion of Ottawa.

Emard Vaudreuil, 116 lbs., and Kid Bergeron, 120, was to be five 2-minute rounds, but Bergeron cut it short. The first round was about even, no one being much hurt, but in the second round Bergeron let loose an avalanche of lefts and rights that rocked Vaudreuil. In this round Vaudreuil put his thumb out of joint and could not continue. The referee gave Bergeron the decision.

Pete O'Brien, 126 lbs., vs Lawrence Dubois, 126, was a five 2-minute round feature. It went the limit. Dubois was much shorter than his opponent and had trouble in getting any blow in but when he did O'Brien felt them. Dubois was an easy winner, taking four of the five rounds besides almost scoring a knockout in the last.

Bert Dempsey, Timmins, 137, vs Pat Walsh, Toronto, 135, was stopped in the second round. The first was slow, both fighters clinching, with Walsh appearing to have the edge. In the second Walsh smothered Dempsey with rights and almost knocked him down, but Dempsey came back quickly and knocked Walsh for a count of nine. Walsh had no sooner gained his feet than Dempsey again felled him for the count of seven. When he got up again Dempsey once more put him down for a count of four. When Referee Leonard reached "four" Walsh raised both knees off the ground and sat on the ropes, thereby making himself refused to be hit, but Dempsey refused to hit him again when he was almost unconscious. Referee Leonard then gave the decision to Dempsey. This was a real scrap and Dempsey got a real ovation as he left the ring.

Matt Roach, 154, vs Bill Thompson, 148, was great stuff for the fight fans. There were to be ten 2-minute rounds but the decision was given in the ninth. In the first round Roach got away with some rabbit punches in the clinches, while Thompson was breaking clean. Thompson had to take the most of the punches in the second round, but he was getting in some good ones himself at the bell. In the third round Roach hit Thompson after the bell, but the Kirkland man refused to claim the fight when asked by the referee. In the fourth Roach was down twice but came close to knocking Thompson out of the ring. Thompson came back strong in the fifth and almost scored a knockout.
