**WM. PARCHER BEREAVED BY THE DEATH OF HIS MOTHER**

Friends in Timmins and district will extend sincere sympathy to Wm. Parcher, for many years a popular resident in the camp being a long time on the Hollinger Mine staff, and also for several years on the Timmins police force, in the death of his mother, Mrs. Mary Ann Parcher, of Combermere. Mr. Parcher's mother passed away last week in her 72nd year. She was the widow of the late Cyrus Parcher, who had farmed in the Combermere district of Renfrew County for a great many years. The funeral of the late Mrs. Parcher was conducted in the Mission Church of St. Paul's, Combermere, on Wednesday of last week, Sept. 28th. The chief mourners were Mr. and Mrs. Wm. **Camp Loses One of Its First Residents**

Mrs. Wm. Baker, in Porcupine Since 1910, Passes Away While on Visit to Her Daughter in Vancouver, B.C.

The Porcupine camp lost one of its first residents in the death at Vancouver, B.C., on Sept. 24th, of Mrs. Kate Baker, wife of Wm. Baker, 75 Balsam street, south. The late Mrs. Baker was on a visit to her daughter, Mrs. F. Bushay, Vancouver, when she was taken ill. Mr. Baker went at once to Vancouver on learning of his wife's serious illness and he was with her when she passed away. Death followed a paralytic stroke.

The late Mrs. Baker had wide circles of friends in Timmins and the Porcupine camp and there will be deep sorrow at her death. She was one of the very first women residents of the camp, the family coming to Porcupine in 1910. At the time of death Mrs. Baker was 63 years of age.

In addition to the bereaved husband, the late Mrs. Baker is survived by five daughters and one son. There are also fifteen grandchildren and one great-grandchild. The daughters are Mrs. C.
