Miss Monck's body found shortly after 4 p.m. yesterday and brought into town by plane."

## ONTARIO CABINET RATIFIES PURCHASE OF CANYON POWER

A despatch from Toronto on Wednesday says:—The Ontario Cabinet has ratified the purchase of the Abitibi Canyon development plant, otherwise the Ontario Power Service Corporation, by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, Premier George S. Henry announces.

Already 90 per cent. of the Ontario Power Service Corporation bonds have been handed in to be exchanged for Hydro bonds, and it is expected the entire \$18,000,000 in bonds will shortly be turned in.

Premier Henry said he had communicated with Hon. J. R. Cooke, chairman of the Hydro Commission, directing that in view of the completion of the purchase, work at the Canyon be resumed at once. It is expected this work will be on at least two of the five generators.

## GOOD SPORTS INJURED BY THOSE NOT SO THOUGHTFUL

As The Advance pointed out in recent weeks the action of a number in shooting partridge out of season has had an unsatisfactory result for those more sportsmanlike and law-abiding. The partridge season opened this week and large numbers from Timmins and district hoped to enjoy good sport in this line when it was lawful. This summer there were certainly enough partridge for all, but the action of a few in starting the partridge shooting before the season opened had several effects such as killing off the birds in certain localities, frightening them away from particular areas, and so on. In addition the weather on Monday was unfavourable for partridge shooting the birds having a tendency to keep under cover rather than come out in the open. Despite all these difficulties many have had good sport in partridge hunting and there have been a few good legal bags made, though the majority have only got one or two birds.

## TRAFFIC TIED UP IN THE AMOS DISTRICT BY STORMS

A despatch Wednesday of this week from Amos says:—"The severest pre-season snow storm in years swept Abitibi today. Prospectors in the bush country struggled in the drifts, most of them making toward the nearest settlement. Indians say an early and long Winter may be expected."
