Canadian Legion's First Fall Meeting

Comprehensive Report Made by President Neame of the Provincial Convention Held at Sault Ste Marie

The opening meeting of the Fall session of the Timmins Branch of the Canadian Legion took place on Saturday evening in the Oddfellows' hall, Timmins with a very large attendance present. Visitors were also present from branches in the North.

After a short period of routine business, such as reading reports, committees' reports etc. President Austin Neame, who is the representative of the Northern Zone, gave a full and carefully detailed report of the Provincial Convention which he attended as an officer and delegate, President Austin Neame stated that the convention was one of the best he had attended. There were 116 delegates and 54 proxies in attendance. The election of officers, (published in the Legion Column of this issue) was a complete turnover and the speaker had good words to say for all of them. Austin Neame said "he thought this year's officers were the straightest and squarest bunch of men ever got together in

one body to take charge of the Legion affairs in Ontario. The political resolutions were touched upon, and other reports in connection with the business of the convention. The financial report, he said, was a very important item. It showed that a debt of over \$10,000 had been wiped off, and then it showed a kind of budget which gave in detail the exact standing of the provincial command. In dealing with this, the speaker said it was up to all branches to get away from the local circles. The Provincial and Dominion commands have to be maintained also. Without the per capita tax their work could not be carried on. Branches were urged to make prompt returns to headquarters at least once a month, and in this way the Legion not only in Ontario, but also all over the Dominion will flourish. In closing this part of his address, he stated that if all per capita tax were paid to the Prov. command before March, 1933, there would be a balance of about \$5,000 on the surplus side. The unemployment situation was dealt with and brought forward an interesting point. After a very careful survey made by a special committee the average age of a returned soldier was found to be 44 years. This the committee felt, was one of the reasons for so many ex-service men being unemployed. In their report they stressed

YEAR-ROUND HALF-HOLIDAY NOW PROPOSED IN COBALT

According to word from Cobalt this week the suggestion is being advanced in Cobalt that a weekly half holiday might be observed by merchants throughout the year, and not only in the months of May to September, inclusive, as at present. Some of the grocers are taking up the matter are circulating a petition among themselves, the intention being, it is stated, to ask the town council to pass a by-law providing the necessary number of signatures can be obtained. If a stated proportion of the merchants sign, council has no option but to grant the request for civic legislation. It is reported the idea may spread to other storekeepers in Cobalt. It is worth noting that the grocery and meat stores, as well as the barber shops, in Timmins, have been following out this plan of a year-round half holiday and there has been no appreciable inconvenience to the public or loss to the merchants. In fact it looks to be the other way about. It was thought that other lines of business would follow suit to the general advantage, but has not occurred, some of the stores being opposed to such action. If Cobalt shows the way the example may be followed here.
