YEAR-ROUND HALF-HOLIDAY NOW PROPOSED IN COBALT

According to word from Cobalt this week the suggestion is being advanced in Cobalt that a weekly half holiday might be observed by merchants throughout the year, and not only in the months of May to September, inclusive, as at present. Some of the grocers are taking up the matter are circulating a petition among themselves, the intention being, it is stated, to ask the town council to pass a by-law provided the necessary number of signatures can be obtained. If a stated proportion of the merchants sign, council has no option but to grant the request for civic legislation. It is reported the idea may spread to other storekeepers in Cobalt. 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
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
