HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SEVEN CHILDREN GIVEN TOXOID
 Up to the time of writing 137 children in Timmins have been protected for life against diphtheria by the toxoid treatment given at the Clinic here by local medical men. During the month of October and up to the present time this protection against diphtheria was available at the Clinic each Thursday between 3.30 and 4 p.m. The treatment was available this afternoon, but next Thursday, Nov. 24th, will be the last opportunity for children to be treated at the Clinic for the present. Dr. H. H. Moore, Medical Health Officer, has taken keen interest in the work of protecting the children against diphtheria, and through his efforts and the support accorded him by the other medical men, nurses and others in the town, a particularly large number of children of school age and pre-school age have been protected for life against the danger of diphtheria.

Three Fire Calls Here on the Unlucky Thirteenth
 During the past week the firemen have had five calls, close to one a day, after a period during which there seemed to be few calls. Three of the calls were on the one day—the 13th. Thus it looked an unlucky day, but the town is lucky in its firemen, and so there were no serious results from any of the fires. At 10.55 a.m. on the 13th there was a telephone call to 4 Balsam Street, south, but it was only a chimney fire; at 8.45 p.m. there was a phone call because F. Feldman's truck was on fire, but it was extinguished by the use of the chemical tanks; at 9.40 p.m. there was a telephone call to 83 Third Avenue, but it was only a chimney fire and soon was put out.
 The other two fires were:—one on Nov. 12th, at 11.20 p.m., a phone call to 110 Elm Street, south, for a chimney blaze, and the other on Nov. 14th at 9.10 p.m., another telephone call, to the South End road near the Coniaurum for a Marshall-Eccleston truck that had taken fire, this blaze being extinguished by the use of chemicals.
