TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS

From data in the Porcupine Advance Files.

Ten years ago S. D. Eplett, of the firm of S. D. Eplett & Sons, of New Liskeard, addressed the town council relative to his proposal to establish an ice cream factory and dairy in Timmins. In New Liskeard the firm had been given a ten-year franchise and exemption from all taxes but school taxes, and with free water service. He pointed out the value to the health of the community from pasteurized milk and up-to-date and sanitary dairies. His address made an excellent impression on the council, as being fair and well presented, but the council was not then in favour of making it compulsory to pasteurize all milk sold in town. While welcoming the idea of a new industry for the town, the council expressed itself as not inclined to bonuses or exemptions. The council, however, considered that in view of the need for a ample supply of pure milk in town some form of assistance might be warranted, and the town solicitor was asked to look into the question. Another matter before the council was the question of relief for the town of Haileybury and district. It was found that Timmins had already contributed more than the share suggested by the relief committee and in addition was caring for a number of families from the fire-swept area, these families having come to Timmins. Still further, the council expressed the belief that if further help were needed Timmins would do its part. It was typical of the spirit of the North that Timmins and other towns of the North had done more than what was considered their share, and had given their contributions before they were solicited.

There were 150 men engaged ten years ago in the vicinity of Timmins in the work of removing the bush fire menace. There were three gangs of men working south of the town and another on the north. Fred Hamilton was in charge of the work and the results were very satisfactory.

Ten years ago the township of Tisdale completed arrangements with the town of Timmins for water service for Gillies Lake, Rochester and Bartlemen townships.

Extended underground work was being carried out ten years ago at the Newray property, now operated by the Conlaurem.

There was a large attendance at the social evening held at the Timmins First Baptist Church in connection with the formal opening of their new church building at the corner of Second Avenue and Birch street on Nov. 22nd, 1922. The gathering took the form of a social evening for all to renew friendships and to meet new friends. Rev. C. H. Schutt, superintendent of Home Missions, Rev. G. N. Simmonds, of New Liskeard, and Rev. Mr. Marks, of Cochrane, were among the special guests, as was also Rev. R. S. Cushing, rector of the Anglican church of Timmins, and Rev. J. D. Parks, of the Presbyterian church here. These gentlemen all made brief but very happy addresses of goodwill and friendship. The singing of the male choir was another special feature of the evening's pleasure. Refreshments were served during the evening. Rev. M. R. Hall, the new pastor, proved popular and the highest hopes were roused for progress and development at the First Baptist church. Special services were continued for a week or more each evening in the new church, the speakers for the services including Rev. Mr. Simmonds and Rev. M. R. Hall.

One of the features of ten years ago in Timmins was the opening of the Prince of Wales Cafe and Hotel, next to the New Empire theatre. The building was a fine-appearing brick and tile structure, modernly equipped. It was owned by W. Wing and associates. The opening of the cafe and hotel was made the occasion for a night of hospitality and pleasure, the hotel management inviting large numbers of the citizens to visit the place and enjoy its hospitality. Brown's orchestra furnished the music for the evening. The mayor, members of council and other prominent men of town were among the guests of the evening.

The first concert given by the Caledonian Choir in the New Empire theatre, on Nov. 28th, 1922, was a notable success. There was a full house and everybody was delighted with the programme. The choir under the leadership of Jas. Gells gave a programme of striking merit. The numbers by the choir included: "Hail, Smiling Morn!" "The House that Jack Built," "Songs of Burns," "Auld Lang Syne." In addition there were remarkably fine solos by Mrs. U. L. Acton, W. Ramsay, Mrs. J. K. Moore, Mrs. H. McCulloch, James Cowan. Equally effective duets were given by: Mrs. Dalzell and Mrs. Creaney; Mrs. J. K. Moore and Jas. Gells. The male quartette, Messrs W. Ramsay, H. McCulloch, J. H. Skelly and Jas. Gells, made a noteworthy hit with the audience, while there was great applause won by the mixed quartette, Messrs McCulloch, Skelly and Gells and Mrs. J. K. Moore. Another mixed quartette, Mrs. McCulloch, Mrs. Moore, H. McCulloch and Jas. Gells was also very popular. In the instrumental music the Caledonia orchestra made a notable hit. This orchestra included Messrs F. J. Wolno, W. Brown, W. H. Wilson and others. A cornet solo of remarkable talent was given by O. Brown. The accompanists for the evening were Miss Fern McCarthy and W. H. Wilson. G. A. Macdonald, president of the Caledonian Society of Timmins, introduced the evening's programme, emphasizing the fact that un-

The animals were caught by the Esquimaux, chiefly by the use of a wire snare. The shipment was insured for \$100,000.00.

The resignation of W. L. Warrell, as town clerk of Cochrane, was announced ten years ago. Mr. Warrell had been appointed Clerk of the District Court for the new judicial district of Cochrane.

The Advance ten years ago noted the progress being made in the re-building of the town of Haileybury after the disastrous bush fire.

"Revised train service on the T. & N. O." was a heading in The Advance ten years ago. The improved service was along the line of the resuming for the winter months of what was termed "the summer service."

John Vanier was re-elected mayor of Iroquois Falls by acclamation at the nominations held on Nov. 27th, 1922.

The Advance reported a remarkably fine musical programme at the regular meeting of the Caledonian Society of Timmins ten years ago. The artists included Mrs. H. McCulloch, Mrs. I. Robertson, J. Gells, W. Ramsay, P. Lambert, Mrs. J. K. Moore, H. McCulloch. A brief address by M. B. Scott was another feature of the evening. There was also dancing, refreshments, etc.

Among the local and personal items in The Advance ten years ago were the following:—"Nap Servalis, formerly of the King George, South Porcupine, and later of the Matapanick, Haileybury, has purchased the Grimsby Inn at Grimsby, Ont. Mr. and Mrs. H. Mulheron, formerly of the Hotel Goldfields, Timmins, will have charge of the Grimsby Inn for Mr. Servalis." "Dr. J. B. Aiken is moving his dental office into more spacious quarters in the new J. R. Gordon block. Dr. Aiken will move about the first of December." "His many friends in the town and district will regret to learn of the illness of J. E. Salmon, who has been a

long-time resident of the camp, and all will sincerely wish him an early and complete return to health." "Timmins is represented in the 'Lovely Child Competition' being run by The Toronto Star. Among the entries recently published by The Star was a very attractive photograph of Master Roy Carling Brown, the little son of Dr. and Mrs. R. H. Brown." "His innumerable friends in Timmins will be pleased indeed to hear that W. H. Pritchard, who has been in Toronto taking medical treatment, is now making excellent progress to recovery." "J. E. Garrett, jeweller, returned last week from a visit to Toronto." "There was another little wreck on the T. & N. O. last week when an engine jumped the track at New Liskeard. No one was hurt, little damage was done, and traffic was delayed only about one hour." "A. R. Globe, manager of the Night Hawk Peninsular Mine, returned to the camp last week after a visit to the town. Mr. Globe was a guest at the dinner given on Nov. 20th at the William Penn hotel, Pittsburgh, Pa., by the board of directors of the Callinan-McKay Exploration Company and the Night Hawk Peninsular Mines." "A report in Toronto newspapers last week to the effect that Frank McGuire, the Timmins star centre man, was to be signed this season with St. Patrick's turns out to be much like some of the other news in outside papers. Frank himself said it was news to him. There was some truth in the despatches however, for they referred to Frank as "one of the best stick-handlers in hockey" and "one of the leading goal-getters in the N.O.H.A." "P. L. Smith was in Toronto last week for medical examination in connection with his overseas service." "Her many friends will regret the illness of Mrs. John Skelly and will wish her a speedy return to health." "W. Ling, formerly of the Queen's hotel, will operate a new cafe in the Bardeeson block to be known as the Goldale Cafe." "Present indications suggest that North Bay will have a fast junior hockey team for the season of 1922-23. North Bay does not expect to have senior hockey." "There are now between 15 and 20 wireless outfits in active use in Timmins, and so there is a regular host here of radio fans. The local fans are having great success now in listening in on concerts, etc., and report that very clear reception of wireless from many broadcasting stations at considerable distance from the Porcupine." "A gentleman coming down this week from Cochrane says that 42 miles of the new T. & N. O. extension will be fully completed by Christmas. At present there is a stretch of 30 miles that is completed and that trains can run over, and have run over. Premier Drury and party recently went over this 30-mile stretch by train and Chairman Geo. W. Lee and other members of the T. & N. O. Railway commission have been over more than once. The contractor expects to have another twelve miles completed by Christmas. This will bring the completed section a little this side of Newbist, some 42 miles north of Cochrane."

To the Voters of the Town of Timmins

Timmins, Ont., Dec. 1st, 1932

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Election of Mayor and Councillors for 1933 will take place at the Central Public School, corner of Fourth Avenue and Pine Street on Monday next, December 5th, 1932, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. While I regret any inconvenience which may be caused I sincerely hope you all will make it a point to exercise your franchise.

The year 1932 has been a particularly trying one for Councils of all municipalities throughout Canada due to the depression with its unemployment and relief problems and I am sorry that the cost of the election could not have been diverted to assist the needy.

Many municipalities unfortunately are to-day in a very embarrassed financial position and it is with pleasure I refer you to the financial statement of our town published in last week's issue of The Porcupine Advance.

The taxpayers appear to give general approval of the manner in which the 1932 Council is handling the relief problem while we have had splendid co-operation from both the Provincial and Dominion Governments in the past, and other measures are now under consideration for the future.

During the past year approximately two miles of trunk sewers have been laid in Timmins. 120 additional sewer connections were made. 210 additional water services were installed. 5,400 feet of new water mains laid. Nearly 7,000 yards of gravel was put on the streets. New cement walk was built in front of town hall and from Post Office to Hospital while 3,000 feet of new board walk was put down. All of this work is paid for.

No new debentures have been issued since 1929 and during the time I have had the honour of serving you as Mayor the interest payments on debentures have all been met promptly and the principal sum of debentures has been reduced by approximately \$300,000.00

If you approve of the manner in which your affairs have been handled by the 1932 Council I would greatly appreciate your vote and influence for members of that council, including myself, who are candidates for re-election.

If re-elected I can assure you I shall endeavour to deal fairly with all citizens in matters coming before me in the interest of the citizens at large as in the past.
