St. Mary's hospital has found i necessary in the last few days to restrict the number of visitors at the hospital. Only in very special cases are visitors allowed to see patients at the hospital these days and general visiting at the hospital is being discouraged. The reason for this is the prevalence in town of colds and other mild illnesses and the desire of the hospital authorities to protect the patients from any chance of infection from these sources. The discouraging of visitors to the hospital has given rise to various rumours that are unfounded. One of these was to the effect that there were so many cases of colds in the hospital among the patients that reverse of this is the fact. Another hospital that is in a manner quarantining the outside for the benefit of the matter is simply a case of the hospital protecting its patients from danger of infection by common colds. The arrangement is only temporary and will be discontinued as soon as the general health in town is normal again.

Rabbi Holtzman does not impress them more. one as a conspicuous personality; rather humble in appearance and retiring in demeanor, this eminent man does not betray his greatness until he begins to speak. Only then, does his intellect and spiritual force assert itself! Only then, does he virtually mesmerize his audience into a trance as he reveals in simple eloquence, vivid panoramas of life, or brings before you facts to prove the greatness of the Torah! For Rabbi Holtzman is a staunch supporter of the Jewish religion in its entirety and not to be confused with any so-called

reform ideas. The Rabbi's subjects for the two nights were "Judaism," "Morality," and "Religion." Lack of space does not permit even an outline of his great orations. His most noteworthy assertions were:-that because the world has violated God's Commandment of "Thou shalt not kill" the present plight engulfed mankind following the war; that the worshipping of the "Golden Calf" of modern times is responsible for our social corruption, suffering and moral turpitude. For the great victory of religion Rabbi Holtzman said:-"There was a time when Darwinism with its evolution theories and the widespread cults of atheists cast a shadow on all religions threatening to make us a Godless people, robbing us of spiritual faiths and noble ideals. But now the scientific world, with great minds, such as Professors Osborne, Millikan and Sir Oliver Lodge, in their wonderful research in astronomy, archeology, spiritualism, etc., find authentic proof of the validity of the Old Testament and even a greater assurance of an existing if incomprehensible deity.
